Yucca

Yucca glauca (Agave family) native A very useful plant. Leaves can be shredded from the sharp point to make the equivalent of needle and thread. Shampoo can be made from pounded roots — why a common

Fineleaf hymenopappus

Hymenopappus filifolius (Sunflower family) native. Not very conspicuous, but abundant this year. Flower heads on thin stems. Very fine felt-like hairs on foliage create a graygreen color



Blanket flower Gaillardia aristata (Sunflower family) native. Commonflowers. These are very attractive to butterflies

Prickly poppy

Argemone hispida (Poppy family) native The largest and showiest plant right now. The foliage



resembles thistle, and has numerous prickles on the stem and especially on the veins of the leaves. The flowers are distinctly poppy-like. There are almost always orange beetles and other insects on them





Geyer's larkspur Delphinium geyeri (Buttercup family) native These strikingly blue and beautiful flowers can be toxic to cattle and horses







Little sunflower

Helianthus pumilus (Poppy family) native Very common this time of year. Stems and leaves have stiff, bristly hairs and feel a bit like sandpaper to the touch.

Winterfat

Krascheninnikovia lanata (Goosefoot family) native Shrubby clumps look gray because of very hairy flower heads. Provides excellent winter forage for animals.





Scarlet beeblossom

Oenothera suffrutescens /Gaura coccinea/ (Evening primrose family) native. These beautiful small plants have a long blooming season. Notice the red anthers that produce pollen on long stalks well beyond the petals. The white stigmas where the pollen lands to fertilize the flower also extend well beyond the petals. Very common this year
