## RECYCLING GUIDE

## For the Curbside Recycle Bin

## WRAPPING PAPER

Recycle wrapping paper in your curbside bin, or in the mixed paper bin at the City's Timberline Recycling Center. No metallic wrapping paper or ribbons or bows.

## TISSUE PAPER

Recycle tissue paper in your curbside bin, or in the mixed paper bin at the City's Timberline Recycling Center. No tissue with glitter or metallics.

## CARDBOARD

Recycle cardboard in your curbside bin, or at the City's Timberline Recycling Center. Disposing of cardboard in the trash is illegal in Fort Collins.


## Tree Recycling



Recycle your live Christmas tree at the following drop off locations. Fees apply, contact specific location for details.*

Be sure to remove all items from the tree before dropping off, including: lights, wire, hooks, ornaments, tinsel and fake snow.

- Timberline Recycling Center Hard-to-Recycle Materials Yard, 1903 S, Timberline Rd. $\$ 5$ entry fee, plus $\$ 5$ per tree.
- Ewing Landscape Materials 3501 E. Prospect Rd. \$5 per tree.
- Larimer County Landfill Green Waste Program, 5887 S. Taft Hill Rd. $\$ 5$ per tree. Dec. 26- Jan. 16.
*Free drop off program for trees will not be available this year. Previous drop off locations in city parks will not be open.


## Recycle Elsewhere <br> DO NOT PUT IN CURBSIDE BIN

## BATTERIES

Drop off batteries at the Hard-to-Recycle
Materials Yard at the City's Timberline Recycling Center or at Larimer County's Household Hazardous Waste Facility. Do not place in curbside recycle bin.

HOLIDAY LIGHTS \& EXTENSION CORDS
Recycle strings of lights and extension cords at scrap metal recyclers. See fcgov.com/a-z for details.

## PLASTIC BAGS

Recycle clean, dry, empty plastic bags at grocery stores, specific retail stores, and at the City's Timberline Recycling Center. For complete details, see $\boldsymbol{f c g o v . c o m / a - z .}$

STYROFOAM \& PACKING PEANUTS
Can be reused or thrown in the trash.

## ELECTRONICS

Disposing of electronics in the trash or in your curbside recycle bin is illegal in Colorado due to the toxicity of their components. Find out where to safely dispose of household electronics at
fcgov.com/a-z. Fees apply.

## COOKING OIL

For a \$5 entry fee, you can drop off used cooking oil in a clear, sealed container at the City's Timberline Recycling Center Hard-to-Recycle Materials Yard. Do not put fats, oils, and grease down the drain. Limit 5 gallons.
