How does it work?

It's simple. More than 8,000 communities (that's more than 101 million families in 30 million households) already pick up newspapers, cans, bottles and other items at curbside or drop-off recycling sites.

If each of these families adds at least one paper grocery bag a week to their recycling, Americans will recycle more than a billion bags a year (that's 1,000,000,000 bags). Take action today to reuse and recycle your paper grocery bags and boxes!
