Why Are We Getting Old Fast?

- Currently very few people over the age 65.
 - 4th lowest share of all states in US (10%)
- Baby Boomers
- Born 1946 1964
- 1,340,000 Boomers in Colorado (26% of pop. in 2010)
- By 2030, Colorado's population 65+ will be 125% larger than it was in 2010 growing from 555,000 to 1,243,000. (just from aging)
- Transition age distribution from "young" to more US average between 2010 and 2030.

Migration of the 65+

- 1. Net migration to Larimer for the 65+ averaged 469 per year from 2000-10
- Net migration to Larimer for the 65+ has averaged just under 500 per year since 2010.
- 3. 500 per year is approximately 15% of the population aging into the 65+ each year.
- 4. Statewide net migration of the 65+ has average 4.3% relative to the population aging into the 65+ since 2010
- Larimer ranked 4th highest in its share of 65+ net migrants relative to the population aging into the 65+ age group.
 (Broomfield - 44%, Douglas - 27%, Elbert - 17%, Weld - 11%, Adams - 10%, Arapahoe-8%, Mesa - 6%).
- 6. We expect these shares to decline over time following trend
