#### "BE LOCAL" IS MORE THAN JUST A TRENDY PHRASE.

It's a philosophy that encourages us to be a part of a community, support one another and our environment, and enjoy this place we call home.

#### SHOP FORT COLLINS FIRST

A major component to being local is supporting the local economy; when you choose to shop in Fort Collins as opposed to outside city limits or online, you are supporting local jobs and City services. Shopping locally isn't limited to locally-owned businesses; any purchase within City limits, whether at a small boutique or a national retailer, helps the local economy.

However, there are more than 400 businesses employing nearly 7,200 people that are entirely unique to Fort Collins. To encourage folks to frequent these local businesses, the City of Fort Collins sponsored the 2nd annual Be Local Coupon Book produced by the Rocky Mountain Sustainable Living Association. The book includes coupons for more than \$6,000 worth of savings. Visit fcgov.com/business for outlets and details.

#### SUSTAINABLE CHOICES

Being local also means making sustainable choices to preserve our community. This year the City, in partnership with the Downtown Development Authority and the Downtown Business Association, replaced the conventional holiday lights with LEDs (light emitting diode). The result is a reduction of energy use by approximately 90 percent!

For those interested in replacing traditional holiday lights with LEDs, Fort Collins Utilities is partnering with local retailers to provide discounts from Nov. 1–Dec. 15. Plus, residents can save even more by recycling conventional light strings at the Holiday Lighting Turn-In Events:

# Grocery Tax Rebate

The City of Fort Collins is offering a rebate for sales tax paid on groceries. If you qualify, you could receive \$40 for each person in your household.

It is easy to apply and no receipts are needed. Simply fill out an application, provide proof of your income for 2007, and provide a copy of your Colorado driver's license (or other ID) along with your signature on the affidavit confirming your legal presence in the U.S. Applications and further details, including income requirements, are available at fcgov.com/rebate or call 416-2304. To be eligible, you must currently live within Fort Collins city limits and lived within city limits for all of 2007. The deadline to apply is December 31, 2007.
