





Fort Fund

- The City of Fort Collins invests in arts and culture by allocating a portion of the lodging tax revenues. Fort Fund was started in 1989.
- Applications are reviewed by the City of Fort Collin's Cultural Resources Board. Recommendations on funding events are submitted to the Fort Collins City Council for final approval.

- □We are a Public/Private Partnership City of Fort Collins and the Friends of The Gardens, a 501(c)3 organization.
- We are a part of the City's Cultural Services Department. Our counterparts include the Lincoln Center, Museum of Discovery, Art in Public Places, and the Carnegie Center for Creativity.
- ❑We are a 12 acre garden centrally located in Fort Collins near the Spring Creek Trail, MAX bus, and Transfort bus service.



History

- The Gardens on Spring Creek was first envisioned in 1986.
- □ The Visitor's Center opened in 2004.
- Children's Garden opened in 2006.
- □ Garden of Eatin' and Wetland Demo site opened in 2009 & 2010.
- □ Rock Garden opened in 2011.
- □ Sustainable Backyard built in 2012.



2018 Highlights

- We broke ground on the completion of our Master Plan!
- □ 692 volunteers contributed 10,711 hours
- Over \$200,000 raised through special events such as the Spring Plant Sale, Garden a'Fare and Garden of Lights to benefit our mission.
- Almost 7,000 pounds of produce from the Garden of Eatin' was donated to the Food Bank.
- □ 672 member households a record.
- □ 89,000 visitors in 2017.

Volunteers

- The purpose of the Gardens on Spring Creek volunteer program is to enrich the lives of volunteers and community members through horticulture, create an environmentally and financially sustainable workforce, and to educate others about the benefits of botanic gardens.
- Volunteer roles include gardening, special events, education, administrative/guest services, outreach, marketing/design, internships, property maintenance/construction.
- □ We currently have over 700 volunteers actively working on behalf of The Gardens.
- □ We partner with nearly 50 business groups each year who send corporate volunteers.





Education

- Over 6,000 students visit The Gardens each year, ranging from 2-92 years of age
- Adult Classes range from gardening, art, cooking, crafting, health and wellness among others
- Youth classes include Read and Seed, School Tours and camps: Summer, Spring Break, School's Out Day Camp





Community Gardens

- We have 158 plots at parks and City facilities: Buckingham, Edora, English Ranch, Rogers, Rolland Moore and Twin Silo Park, at Senior Center, and at The Gardens.
- ❑ At the Community Gardens, residents rent plots to grow their own fruits, vegetables, herbs and annual flowers in a ~150 square foot plot.
- Amenities include a tool shed, picnic table, compost bins, hoses and access to water.
 Gardeners are asked to provide their own tools, plants, and other supplies.

Special Events


- 35,000 guests attended special events supporting The Gardens in 2018


