About this Report

As part of the effort to provide residents the opportunity to rate the quality of life in Fort Collins and their satisfaction with community amenities and their local government, the City conducted a scientific survey of 3,000 households within city boundaries. Mailed surveys were sent to randomly selected households in April 2021 and data were collected through May 24, 2021. The survey invitations also contained a URL where the survey could be completed online on Polco in English or Spanish. After the official data collection period was underway (see the report, *The Fort Collins Community Survey Report 2021*), the City of Fort Collins made available a web-based survey to its residents through a link on the City's website and other various communication avenues. Residents were able to complete the survey for two weeks in May 2021 and 241 residents responded, including one Spanish-speaking respondent. This report contains the results of this open participation administration of the web-based survey.

These data were not collected through a random sample and it is unknown who in the community was aware of link on the City's website; therefore, a level of confidence in the representativeness of the sample cannot be estimated. However, to reduce bias where possible, these data were weighted to match the demographic characteristics of the 2010 Census and 2017 American Community Survey estimates for adults in the City of Fort Collins. The primary objective of weighting survey data is to make the survey sample reflective of the larger population of the community. Survey results were weighted using the population norms to reflect the appropriate percent of those residents in the city. The variables used for weighting the household respondent data were gender, age, housing unit type (attached or detached), housing tenure (rent or own), and area of residence. No adjustments were made for design effects. The results of the weighting scheme are presented in the table on the following page.

- I have many friends who rent and n o longer own homes. With the low wages paid at most businesses in this city a good home life is very difficult to attain.

- I live close enough to work that I could walk but I fear being run over at the large intersections I would have to cross
- I live in the far north of the City, and we face numerous obstacles to travel: no safe connection to trails for biking and walking, few options for traveling south via car without potential train blockage, and our only bus (#8) is primarily used by people traveling to and from shelters and services for the poor and homeless. I volunteer at the Food Bank and support the people who use it wholeheartedly, but this means we have more than our share of the mentally ill on our buses. I would hesitate to take a small child on our bus.
- I love the bike accessibility of this town and want to feel safer

- I should feel safe all of the time in my community. The police seem to care, but don't seem to have enough time to deal with quality of life issues that degrade the community.
- I shouldn't have to explain that
- I think it is an important social issue and it affects the quality and safety of the City
- I think this is a huge challenge in our community and the health and stability of all our community directly impacts so many aspects of enjoying living here.
- I walk nearly every day in Old Town and I feel like our sidewalks are decrepit and the crosswalks are dangerous.

- I was born in FC. Almost 30 years later, I can barely afford to raise my family here. When looking at renting or buying a house, we plan to look at neighboring towns in the next year. FC has become too expensive, even with a two parent, making well above minimum wage household.

On top of this, the city wants to place a campus for the homeless here. This is not a solution to the homeless problem. Affordable and subsidized housing is a much better option for those that actually want to live in the community, along with mental health and drug rehab services, and policing of the transients who are not homeless down on their luck folks who need affordable housing, but opportunistic criminals who are passing through dealing drugs and stealing and worse. I see this as I ride my bike from North fort Collins to my Old Town office every single day, and is suspect that the police response also reflects this. The city master plan has no plans for any parks or trails or any solutions to these other issues, and any improvement in infrastructure is likely a decade off at minimum. New businesses would come here if the infrastructure could support them, but without that, we will continue to have falling down buildings and dangerous motels as our neighborhood businesses. Why provide services to an area of the city where there are fewer votes and squeaky wheels? What would the reaction be if you put that homeless campus in a neighborhood next to homes in mid-town, or south Fort Collins? The public outcry would prevent this from ever happening. Why not just shunt all that money to the white folks south of vine so you can get re-elected? Please. Level the spend on parks, trails, community planning, and infrastructure, and help us in North Fort Collins. I and my neighbors and HOA have met with the City on many occasions and it is clear that they just don't care about this part of the City.
