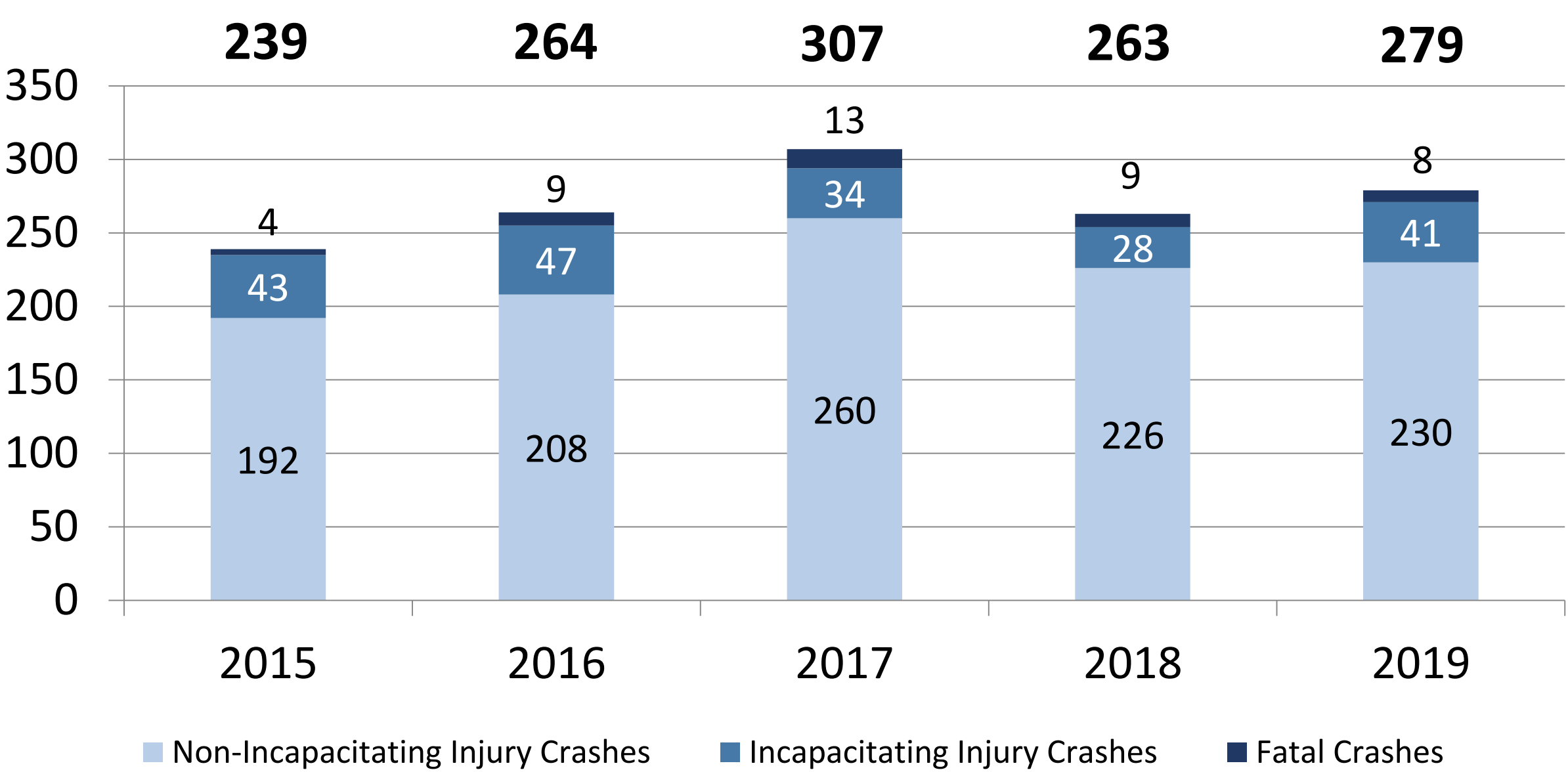

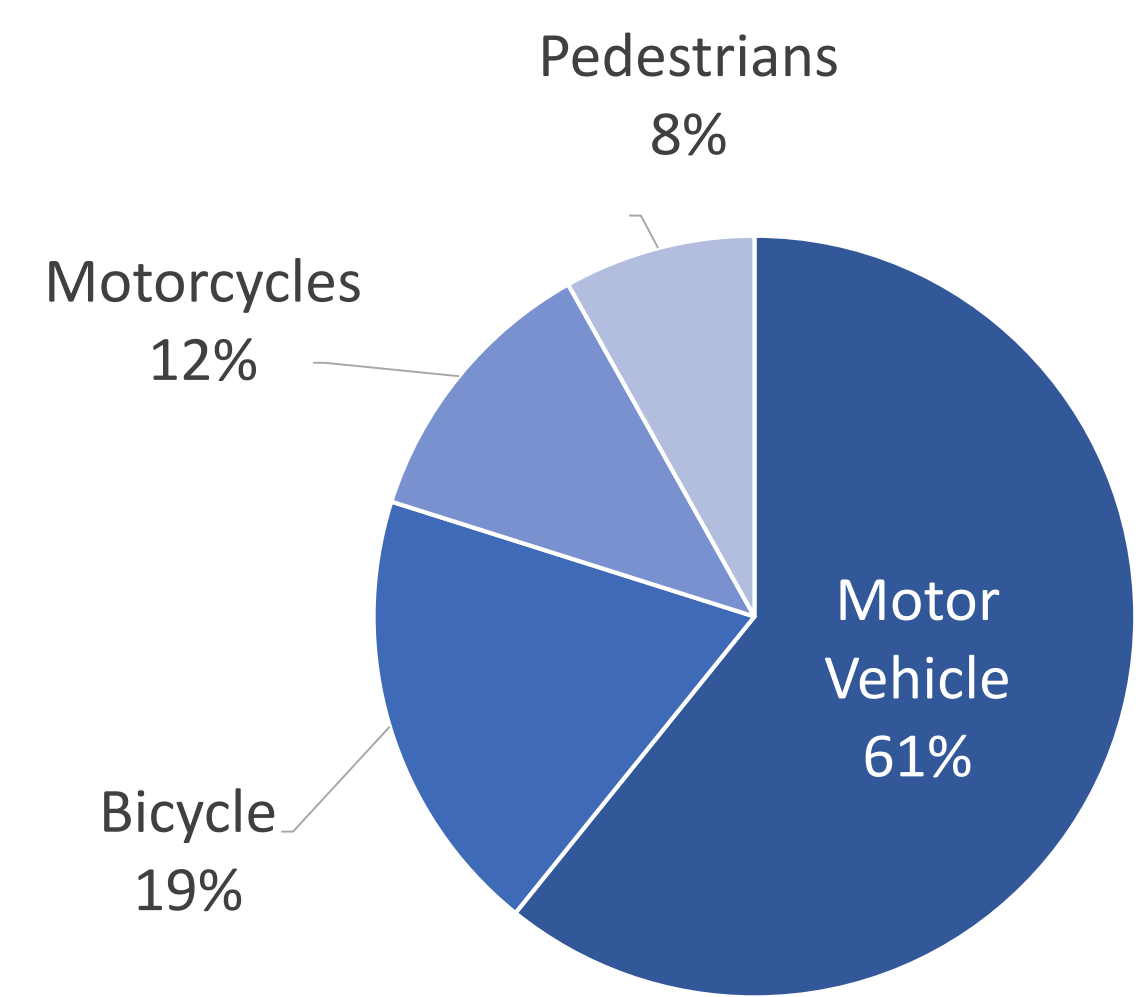
Making progress towards Vision Zero requires a multifaceted, focused effort. It includes collecting, compiling, and analyzing reported traffic crashes to identify crash types, trends, patterns, locations etc. that can lead to mitigation strategies. Safety improvement efforts involve engineering solutions, enforcement efforts, educational outreach, and more.



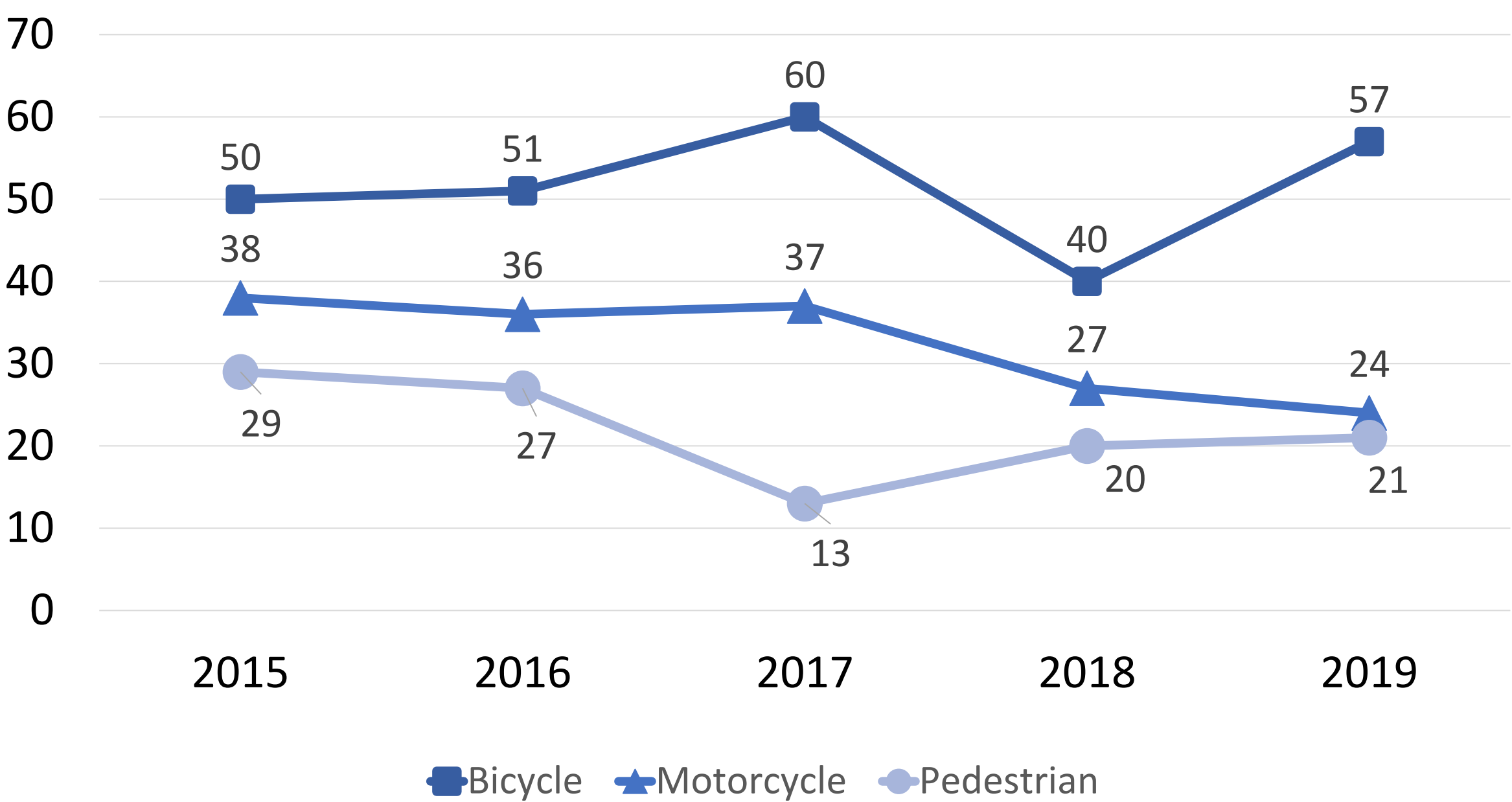
Severe Crashes in the City of Fort Collins

## Recent Safety Related Projects

### Capital Projects

College/Horsetooth crashes **reduced 53%**

### Signal Projects (Flashing Yellow Arrows and Protect Left Turns by Time of Day)

Boardwalk/Harmony

Overall crashes **reduced 27%** and

Left turn crashes on Harmony **reduced 77%**

Snow Mesa/Harmony

Overall crashes **reduced 35%** and

Left turn crashes on Harmony **reduced 70%**

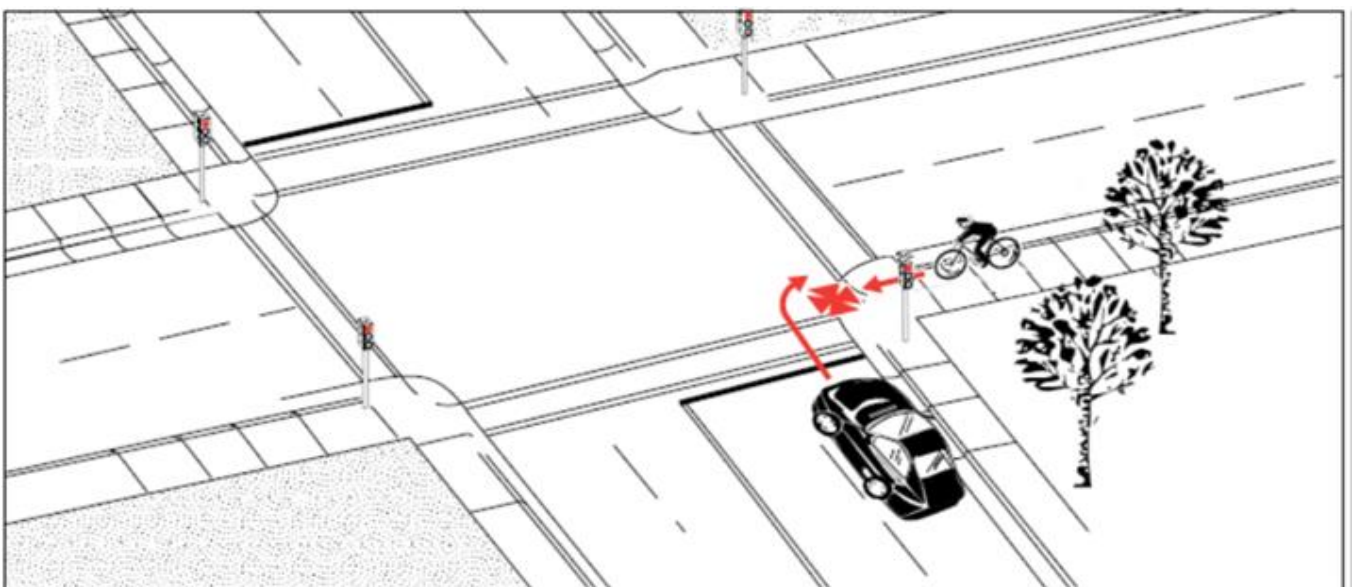
### Pedestrian Safety

Leading Pedestrian Intervals implemented at more than 70 intersections.

Protected pedestrian intervals at three intersections.

## Roadway Safety Reminders

### Right Angle crashes

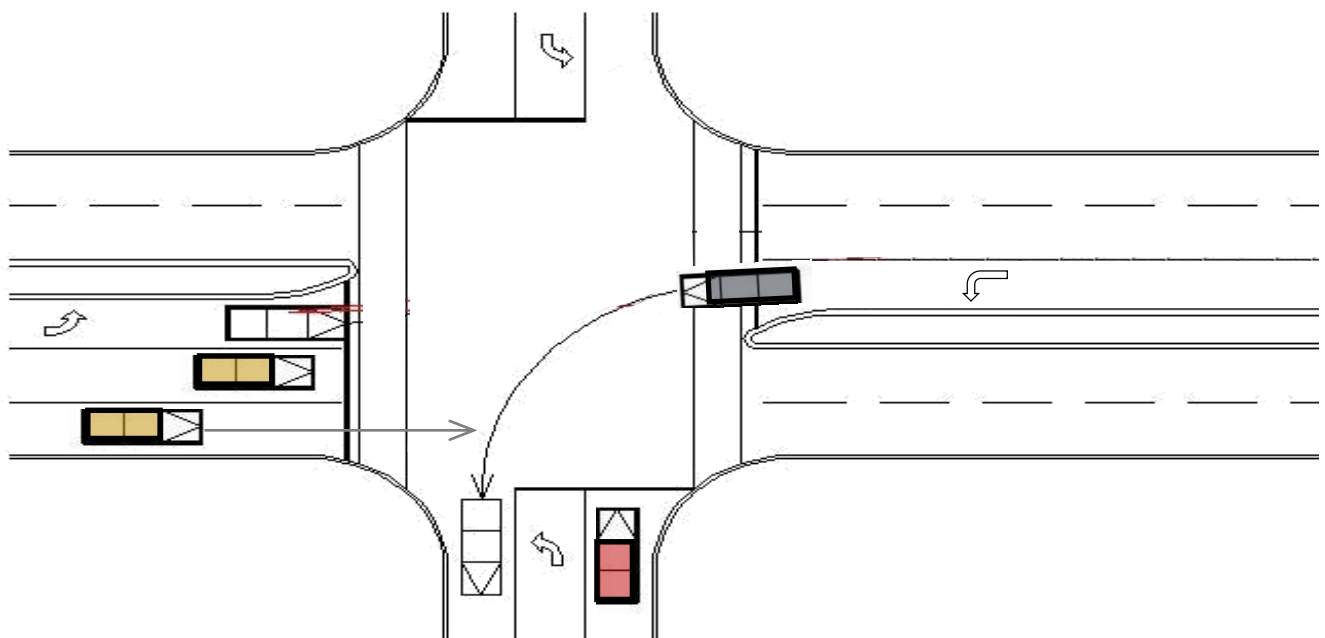


- Make up more than half of all bike crashes.
- 38% of right angle crashes involve a cyclist riding against traffic (in road or on sidewalk)

Motorists: look to the right before turning right

Cyclists: do not ride against traffic

### Approach Turn crashes



- Are often severe
- 75% of approach turn crashes occur at signalized intersections

Motorists: Do not go if you cannot see!

Motorists: As the light changes, wait to ensure that opposing vehicles are stopping before crossing roadway
