Welcome & Introductions

- Group norms help us participate in a way that enables other people's participation as well
- fcgov.com/homelessnesscommittee observers invited to access minutes can ask questions of participants at the break or at the end of the meeting - encouraged to share concerns with individuals in a one-on-one format

Deputy City Manager Introduction and Discussion - Jeff Mihelich

- Origin of Advisory Committee
 - Jeff shared information previously accomplished by the City and stakeholders with the primary focus of the Fort Collins Rescue Mission.
 - In the last 6-12 months, the City and stakeholders held conversations with community partners - asking questions including
 - "How satisfied with how we are serving homeless folks in the community?"
 - Do we have the appropriate facilities in place? We are doing well and could do better
 - Is there a way to find a new and different way to find a new location to serve folks?
 - Is a one-campus model going to serve Fort Collins? Where should we put it?
 - The community requested the process slow down and go back and check the assumptions made over the past six to twelve months and requested the formation of this committee.
 - City Manager hit pause and said get group together to have this conversation
- Why are we here?
 - o Learning together experts in this room and some people new to the situation
 - Personal comments as community participants bring both professional and personal opinions to the table - always wear whatever hat you want
 - Final charge for this committee is to make recommendations to City Manager the committee will decide the format of the recommendation
- City's role in the future of homelessness services facilities:
 - Zoning Board make recommendation on building, planning, parking etc. for any new or upgraded construction
 - City Council
 - Ultimate approver for zoning (or not)
 - If City-owned property they decide if property would be sold or leased (or not)
 - Decide how City funds are allocated to support
- Talked about the themes/focuses areas for the next 12 meetings
 - Jeff shared his opinion that this will be an iterative process won't be winner take all recommendations will be outlined with a different combination of possibilities, or the work could stop in what we are trying to achieve together
 - Would like this group to identify the gap between what we currently do well vs. what possibilities what's working well and what could happen if we do more of that?
 - The HSHO Committee can come to a conclusion and recommendation early; in that case the committee can disband before completing all scheduled meetings.

Participation Discussion - who should be at the table for this committee

- Role of this committee
 - Relationship building
 - o Learning understand issue doing well and gaps
 - Establish transparency
 - Generate creative ideas
 - o Learn models, "best practices"
 - Extend grace
 - o Build on what's been momentum, using assets
- Ideal size of group
 - o 20 is the outer edge of group effectiveness to keep everyone involved

- Potential groups to invite
 - Shelters Catholic Charities (CC) and Fort Collins Rescue Mission (FCRM)
 - Learning what we don't know, building relationships
 - Makeup of committee would go from 22% SMEs to 30%
 - Everyone benefits
 - Larimer County
 - Has assets to build off of
 - Essential community infrastructure
 - Guest experts
 - Family Housing Network
 - City Planning
 - PSD perspective and experience
 - CSU Social Work Research Center

Concerns

- Some groups may benefit from recommendations likely to be made for example talking about future of shelters in our community - potential conflicts of interest mean some might need to recuse themselves from some decisions
- In previous experience, building relationships and having conversations with business owners and people experiencing homelessness in Downtown helped address the "we don't know what we don't know" problem
- Other aspect of representation is balance as stands the committee has four folks who work on housing on a daily basis, or 22% of the group - what percent makes the most sense?

Benefits

- o Opinion posed that we all have something to gain by working on this micro and macro levels
- Utilizing assets the county has significant assets and can help provide more balance to the makeup of the group - who would be the best representative of the county?

Commitments Made

- Checked commitment on extending an invitation to FCRM and CC not everyone agreed all committed
- Checked commitment on encouraging a conversation and invite people to participate from the County - not everyone agreed - all committed

Presentation and Discussion: Homeward 2020 - Housing First Initiative

Holly LeMasurier gave a presentation on Homeward 2020

- o Homeward 2020 is four things Catalyst, Convener, Data-driver, Advocate not a service provider
- Goal: create shared language and understanding of concept models and frameworks
 - Can we end homelessness?
 Homeward 2020 says yes we can provide a rapid response rare, short-lived, and non-recurring rather than solutions to extensive and complex causes
 - Housing First goal to align efforts under foundation that we think about together as housing first as solution to homelessness. Then we do wrap-around services to make sure they can maintain housing - very unique and individualized
 - Other model is Housing Ready do x,y,z before you can get into shelter
 - Dashboard Holly reviewed is publicly available about chronic homelessness in Fort Collins on the Homeward 2020 website - www.homeward2020.org

- Fort Collins has a current affordable housing challenge 40 people got vouchers and still need a place to go
- David Rout commented on current success in Fort Collins- no wrong door for people to walk into when applying for services - well on the way to use common intake system and be fair
- o Questions from Housing First Presentation to address at a later time
 - o How many homes are needed to solve homelessness/ house everyone?
 - o Who isn't helped by Housing First and what can help them?
 - o Data on how people perform better under / with Housing First?
 - o When housed, where housed?






Q1. How well do you think the Fort Collins community is addressing homelessness?




Q2. I believe our community should follow the Housing First approach.




Q3. How often do you interact with people experiencing homelessness?
