Welcome

Shared purpose, background of what was done & appreciation for HAC members.

Kelly DiMartino shared the City is ending their role as convener around this topic. The City will still be a partner in the shared goal of making homelessness rare, brief and non-recurring. Looking to the leadership of our amazing partners in the community for next steps.

Site Comparative Analysis

Randy Shortridge [au]workshop

- Comparison of 2 potential shelter locations based on capacities and effectiveness of locations for additional uses and amenities. Both sites could accommodate the shelter along with other uses, and assumes a maximum 3-story building.

Beth Yonce - City

- Shared comparison of additional factors on two sites such as timing, proximity to existing services, financial, site area, zoning, stormwater, transit, other potential uses.

Q&A

- Commercial space was suggested by the HAC to enhance the site and may include warehousing for donations

Decision Process & Next Steps

Seth Forwood - FC Rescue Mission

- Fort Collins Rescue Mission is the decision maker for location of shelter, as a replacement for the Fort Collins Rescue Mission at the current location on Jefferson which has capacity for 100. Currently turning away people every night.
- Seth welcomes comments from the community, any concerns or offers of aid.
- Expected timing end of May or early June will announce their preferred location, then starting planning and fundraising, etc.
- Experience with 24/7 shelter shift
 - In 2020 the shelter was moved temporarily to Blue Spruce. When they moved back to the building on Jefferson, they started a 24/7 operation which allowed people to reserve their space and have access during the day. This was a more stable environment and helped people get jobs, permanent housing, and kept people off the streets during the day which was a noticeable positive difference for adjacent businesses and neighborhoods.
 - Randy Shortridge affirmed the benefit as an adjacent business. Matt Robenalt-DDA - noted shift in the dynamics with problems that used to happen when the shelter was opening only at certain times. John Feyen - Police Services routine weekly calls to Shelter were common, only 1 call in 2022 which was a

welfare check.

- Joe Sarr at Catholic Charities noted they moved to a 24/7 model as well and have been able to better meet community needs especially for women and families.

HAC discussion & questions

- People experiencing homelessness were involved in understanding needs leading up to discussion of these 2 sites. Proximity to existing services was a priority creating a well-connected system to serve our community members we care about. Seth confirmed they will involve people experiencing homelessness as they move into final selection and design.
- Experience of DDA having shelter as a neighbor has not hindered ability to meet economic goals.
