





Laramie Foothills: Mountains to Plains Project






Land Conservation Acreage: **44,400**



Overarching Goals

- Accelerate the pace of restoration – grasslands by 2019 and Poudre River by 2024 (target priority restoration areas)
- Create high-quality restoration goals with specific plant community composition and target wildlife and plant species of interest habitat needs
- Increase monitoring efforts to increase understanding of NA system, habitat quality and restoration success
- Consider future climatic scenarios in restoration efforts as a necessary consideration for long-term viability







Trails for November



This month we celebrate gratitude and thankfulness- are trails something you are thankful for? November is a great time to visit [Scopetone Prairie Natural Area](#), known for its vast grasslands and wide open spaces. At this remote site you can get a sense of the shortgrass prairie, sagebrush, and various flat terrain in the high country. Thanksgiving day is a great time to hit the hills for horseback riding. Scopetone closes in December, January and February, so it's a great time to make our last visit for 2014! This is the place where endangered black-footed ferrets were reintroduced this year. Wildlife cameras have captured the [first photo of Scopetone's ferret](#). Thank you CSU Wildlife Society volunteers who monitor the motion-triggered cameras!

Looking for somewhere closer to home to explore? Visit [Running Deer Natural Area](#)'s fire cab- it was once on top of White Pine Mountain, 26 miles west of Fort Collins. Years ago, the U.S. Forest Service relied on people (not airplanes or satellite images) to spot forest fires. Real people stationed on remote mountaintops were paid to watch for fires- every day, all summer long. The fire cab (top), is now a nice destination and place to watch for wildlife. Start at the Welcome Center parking lot and head west about 1 mile on the flat trail.

Dam-free Anniversary



A year ago, a stretch of the Poudre River became dam-free when the abandoned Josh Ames diversion structure, at [North Shields Ponds Natural Area](#), was removed. It was replaced with a series of riffles (small rapids). The project was an exciting partnership between the City of Fort Collins Natural Areas Department and the Colorado Water Trust to improve fish passage, connect the river to its floodplain, improve river-based recreation, and reduce downstream


