What is a Wildlife Species of Interest?

This list includes wildlife that are documented in the Foothills natural areas and are:

- 1) Considered Species of Greatest Conservation Need* (SGCN) in the <u>2015 State Wildlife Action Plan</u> (SWAP) (Colorado Parks and Wildlife, 2015); and/or
- 2) Species tracked by Colorado Natural Heritage Program.

Level	Description
G/S-1	Critically imperiled globally/state because of rarity (5 or few occurrences in the world/state; or very few remaining individuals), or because of some factor of its biology making it especially vulnerable to extinction.
G/S-2	Imperiled globally/state because of rarity (6-20 occurrences), or because of other factors demonstrably making it very vulnerable to extinction throughout its range.
G/S-3	Vulnerable through its range or found locally in a restricted range (21-100 occurrences).
G/S-4	Apparently secure globally/state, though it might be quite rare in parts of its range, especially at the periphery.
G/S-5	Demonstrably secure globally, though it may be quite rare in parts of its range, especially at the periphery.
GNR	Not yet ranked globally.
G#T#	Trinomial rank (T) is used for subspecies ranked on the same criteria as G1-G5.
S#B	Refers to the breeding season imperilment of elements that are not permanent residents.
