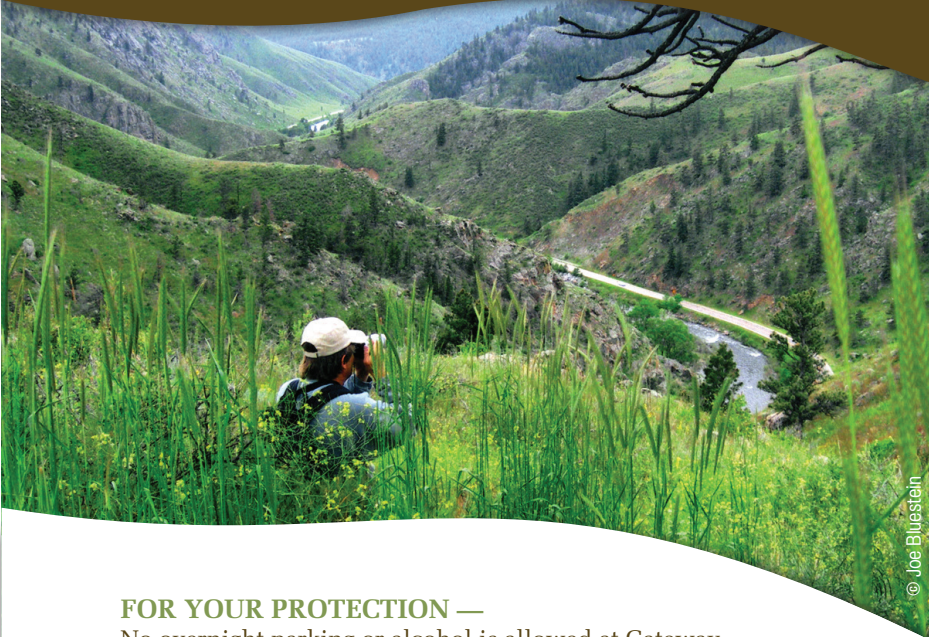

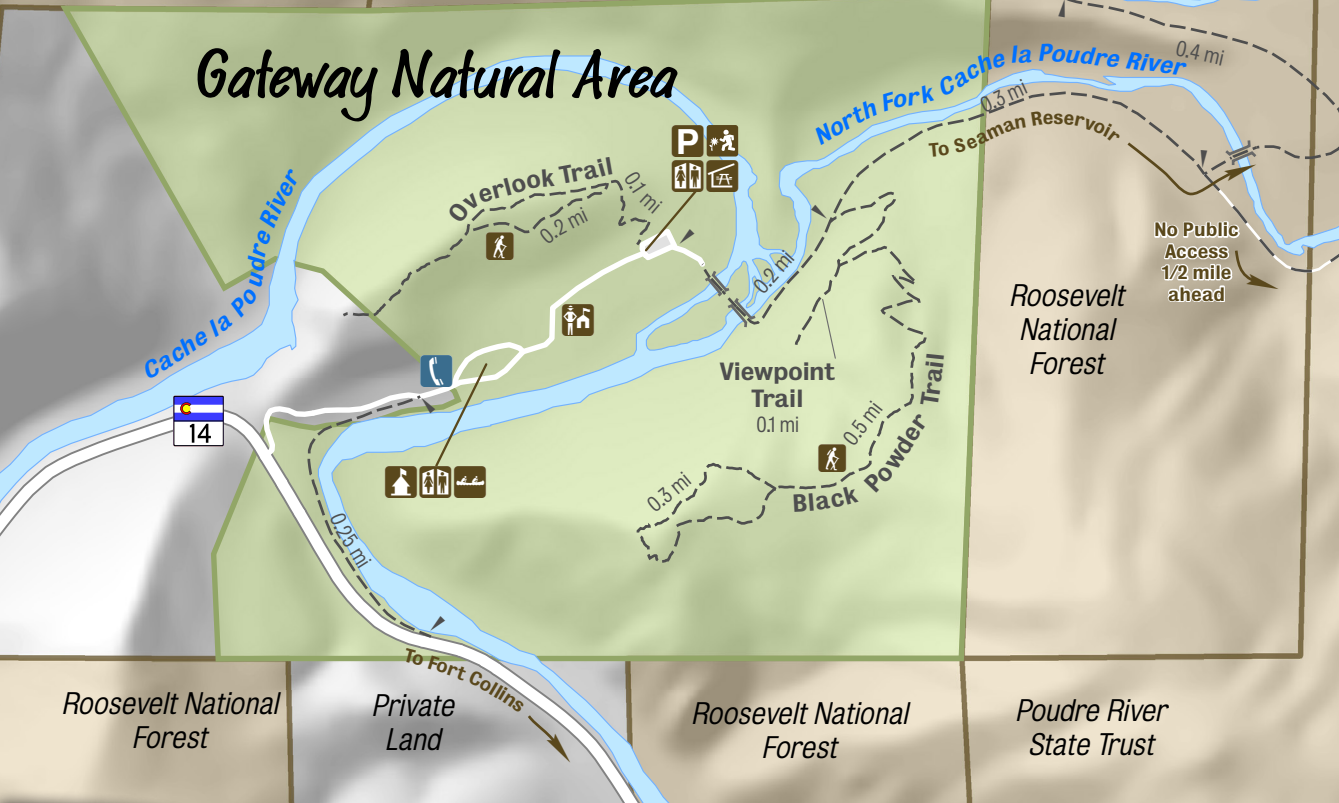

FEES

Required March 1–Nov. 30
\$6.00 per standard vehicle

Annual passes available for \$35.00 per standard vehicle. Annual passes are valid one year from date of purchase.

Shelters: Use of picnic shelters are on a first-come, first-served basis, unless reserved. Shelters can be reserved for \$50 each per day.

LOOKING BACK

In 1903, the City of Fort Collins opened a water treatment facility at the confluence of the Cache la Poudre River and its North Fork tributary. To learn more pick up the *History of Gateway Natural Area* brochure available at the gate station and kiosks.
