Site History

The historic Nix Farm has been the Natural Areas Department's headquarters since 2002. The property was first homesteaded in 1889 and farmed by various owners until the City bought the property in 1996 from Tom and Patsy Nix. The area has been designated a Local Historic District.

The Garden

The native Colorado plants here support the Natural Areas Department's goal to conserve, restore and enhance native plant and animal communities. Most of the landscaping around the Farm House was planted in 2002 and the plants surrounding the Main Office were installed in 2014. The Garden showcases how native plants can rival the attractiveness of typical non-native landscape plant choices while creating habitat in an urban setting. The plants are labeled "Fort Collins Native" or "Colorado Native."
