# Step by Step | How to Plan this Event

# 1 Decide on an Animal

1-2 Months Before Event

Local organizations like the <u>Northern Colorado Wildlife Center</u> and <u>Rocky Mountain Raptor Program</u> offer educational animal visits. Ponder what animal your neighbors might like to learn about.



# Pair the Visit with a Social Activity

Consider splitting your event into two different parts - **the animal visit** and a **fun animal themed activity** to bond with your neighbors! Some options:

### **Night Vision**

Explore your neighborhood from the perspective of a nocturnal animal using night vision glasses!

### **Bird Watching**

Look around your neighborhoods to see how many species of birds are in your backyard.

### Neighborhood Safari

Go on a scavenger hunt to find and photograph different wildlife in the area.

### **Movie Mayhem**

Rent an inflatable TV screen and put on an animal inspired program, like National Geographic.

### **Choose Event Time + Location**

- Choose a time when the wildlife presenter and your neighbors are available. Consider the nature of the animal you want to bring in. Is it nocturnal, or will it be asleep by a certain time in the evening?
- Pick an outdoor location that is **not loud or hectic**, so the animal won't be scared.

# Obtain Permits

If you're closing a residential street, you will need to apply for a <u>Block Party Permit</u> for an eligible street.



### **Reserve Larger Supplies**

If you're renting any supplies, like an inflatable screen, **reserve as soon as possible.**

# 9 Set-Up

Arrive **at least 1 hour early** to set up the presentation area and any activities. Ask the presenter to arrive 15-20 minutes early.

Contact wildlife education organizations, such as Northern Colorado Wildlife Center and the Rocky Mountain Raptor Program.

### Promote Event

- At Least 2-3 Weeks Before | Social Media and Email: Post on Nextdoor, Facebook, and/or Instagram. Email if you can.
- **1 Week Before | Flyers:** Go door-to-door. Design colorful flyers, postcards, or personal invitations.
- 1 Day Before | Reminder: Send out a reminder message on social media or by email.
