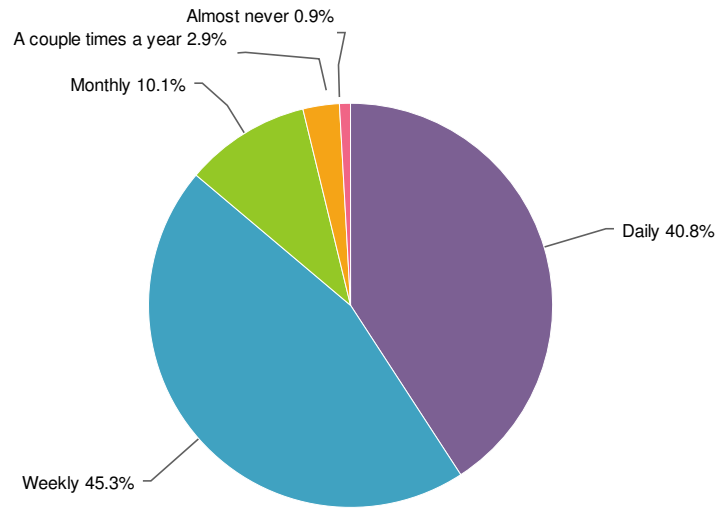


About the Survey:

The Downtown Plan released an online survey in July 2015 to collect community visions, strategies, and preferences about the future of the downtown area. The survey was conducted from July 15, 2015 until September 1, 2015. There were 701 total responses to the survey, and 429 completed responses. All partial and complete responses are included in this report. This survey is one component of a public engagement campaign intended to collect input from a diversity of citizens and stakeholders through public events, surveys, and interviews.

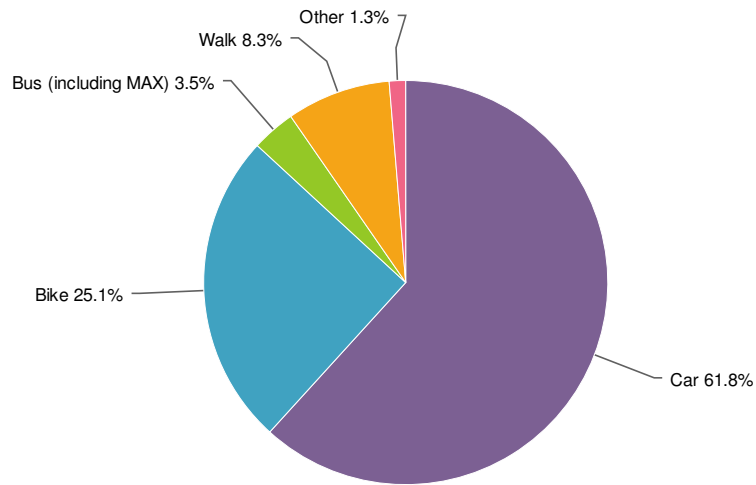

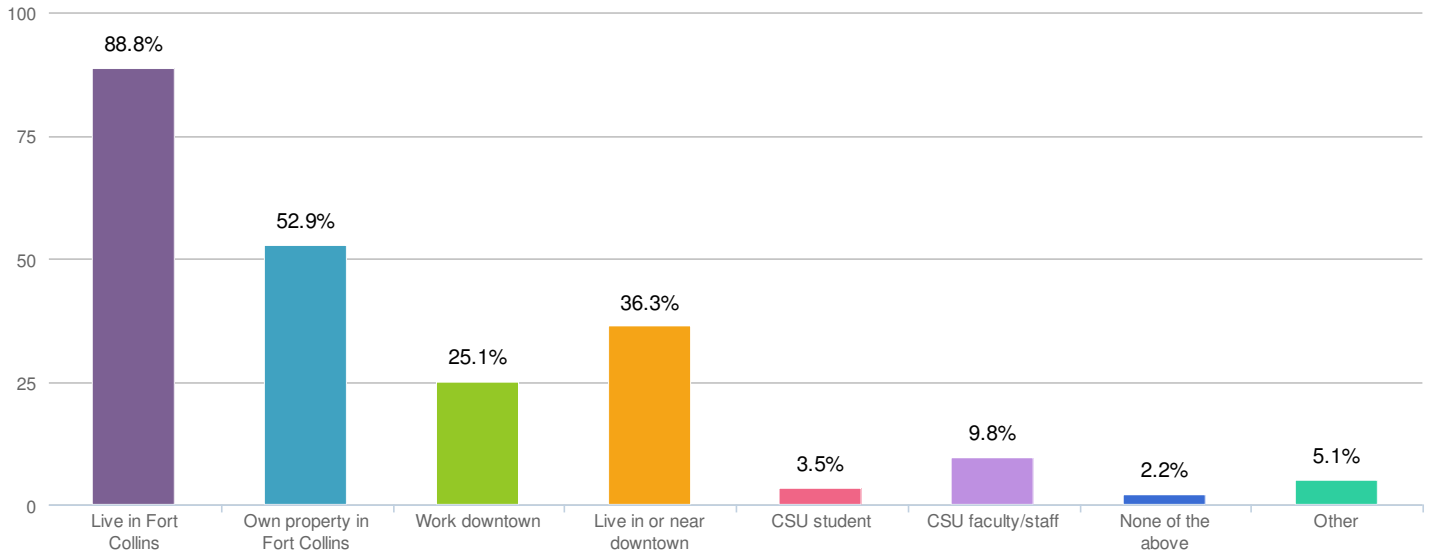
2. How do you get downtown most frequently?

1	It is important to keep the downtown area safe and clean. Everything mentioned above is mute if we allow people to be scared off by aggressive pan handlers and people loitering along the streets.
1	Creative businesses should be applied very creatively. So not just "artists" but graphic design, communications and technology. Please report to community real data about arts impacts beyond art for art's sake as you present these "priorities" without other options. As Governor Hickenlooper just said [paraphrasing], Denver, Boulder, Fort Collins and the rest of the Front Range are doing pretty ok without incentives. State wants to help arts-challenged communities like Pueblo or other outlying areas. Some artists choose their path for quality of life and have independent means, so why make a whole sub-category of public support for that choice?
1	Spread out venues along the Mason Corridor so as to not compete with venues offering different choices for people. If you limit the arts to downtown at the exclusion of other locations in our city we will love downtown to "death."
1	In terms of culture, I think it should be a priority to support Hispanic culture. And it should be kept in mind that culture diminishes as affordable housing disappears.
1	In the long term future Fort Collins might want to become a artists destination, not just a local artist supporter.
1	Love what businesses like the Downtown Artery are doing to promote art and sustainability of a vibrant artist space downtown. I hope the City supports their efforts, leverages their success to date, and builds on what they have done and are doing.
1	Support program ideas like Streetmosphere that pay the artists and provide a vibrant draw to downtown and promotes a safe, fun family environment.
1	Include more art downtown and in surrounding areas that's interactive... that people are going to want to pose with and share selfies of themselves with.

1	There are some great examples of low-income artist communities with shared workspace, or housing for multiple populations. One in NY houses low-income actors and formerly homeless people (http://www.commonground.org/our-buildings/the-schermerhorn/#.Va66VSpViko)
1	Keep rent low on buildings in old town that could be studio space. Have city studio space that folks could rent out affordably.
1	I feel like it is being done well now with the types of events. There is quite a bit of arts and culture. Events like New West Fest seem to go well, but venues for Brewfest and Taste of Fort Collins are small. Increasing venue sizes would be ideal.
1	keep doing what you're doing, like painting the utilities boxes and art-ifying the alleyways, etc.
1	Financial incentives (possible rent subsidies) to bring creative business to an area that likely is not financially feasible currently.
1	To keep people engages, I think infrastructure is key - having a reliable place to go to create/experience the arts.
1	Artist and creative people do not make much money and generally can't afford to live downtown. The creative force needed to creat or maintain a sense of place takes a 24 hour presence and not just an 8 to 5 hours of operation. The downtown area needs less restrictive zoning restrictions then the suburbs so that move creativity can happen.

1	Encourage the development of a sharing economy, where artists can split the responsibilities and costs of gallery/studio space. Offer incentives for property owners to rent to artists and creative people at affordable rates.
1	Business owners need to support musicians, artists, performers by paying them for their contributions to the art scene. Many artists and musicians can't support themselves without income from the work they do entertaining crowds downtown. All businesses benefit from the crowds that free music events draw because they are free, and bring shoppers and diners to downtown.
1	Foster arts education and influence through transparent leadership and governance by artist groups
1	Where we come from - there is a yearly arts/crafts festival that is totally family oriented with booths, food and people who rent a space are provided tents and show and sell their wares, art and crafts. It would require a large open space and maybe the downtown folks should figure out some way to build a very large park or structure to house such a venue.
1	#1 and 2 can be accomplished by making #3 possible. This could be accomplished with low-interest loans, subsidized housing and work spaces for artists in all disciplines and in creative businesses. Perhaps public/private partnerships with banks, developers, property owners and the development/permit process could help.
1	Continue to improve alleyways. Add murals. Creative bike racks (as functional art). Continue to support painting electric utility boxes and pianos. Artistic planters that can look beautiful even in winter.
1	By supporting artists and culture, making studio spaces available and affordable and making art easily accessible to community members and visitors. Also, by being selective about public art, FC should be know for exceptional art by exceptional artists.
1	From my previous Palo Alto days, I remember with relish the murals painted on the various buildings - "local scenes" of families interacting with their local environments.... I realize that there have been some murals in Old Town, but they include something more than "abstract" or mode images. Also, I would like to see gardens spilling over the sides of rooftops - whether part of a restaurant's environment, or commercially grown "farmers' markets".
1	I don't think it is possible. I think we are growing and developing at such a rate that the cost of properties is only going up. Starving is the only option! Or the development of an art community (residential) where properties are cheaper (e.g., the industrial area) with selling left to downtown
1	think global, buy local- is a theme. Think about a public market. When there is a collaboration for all businesses to be in one space- it will help out.
1	Set aside dedicated funding for arts and culture. Periodically solicit input from community on how to spend these funds.
1	Allowing community officers to move loiterers along. For my part, and most of my friends, we make sure to leave Old Town by dark because that is when "the vampires" come out!
1	Promote more collaboration between the art/music organizations. I love what Bohemian has done for Fort Collins, but it almost seems homogenized (my one complaint about the FoCo art scene). I want to see more "coming together of the minds" - collaboration between the Artery, the city, Spokesbuzz, and all the local artists coming together to form a cooperative of sorts to innovate and have the art/culture scene grow from a grassroots level. Again, Bohemian has done wonders for Fort Collins, but it is starting to feel a little Disney land like (New West Fest, and other "creative" initiatives happening behind the scenes rather than with public input). I would like to see more cutting edge, risky art. More than just music! More affordable art experiences (beyond the Lincoln Center)! Especially DANCE. And, more Art that challenges the way we think (like a Bread and Puppet Theater)!!!!!! Art for a cause. Educational art. Advocacy art.
1	By doing just that! Invite local artists to your events to add a splash of color and life. I know tons of really inspirational "Alex Gray" inspired artists who have incredible talent who'd love to showcase their art for free anytime.
1	You can't effectively control the price of living or work space. The market in Fort Collins for those things has been destroyed. Good luck with that.

Count	Response
1	City endorsement and support of the SCFD (Scientific and Cultural Facilities District) ballot initiative. One-tenth of one percent sales tax to non-profit cultural agencies.
1	Get some younger blood on the cultural resources and art in public places boards. Create incentives for area businesses to work with local artists for mural and design work. Also, a "Free Speech Wall" similar to that in Charlottesville, VA, might be interesting and help to encourage creativity at all levels.
1	Continued push for more art, music, etc. Unite creatives together with groups, events, studio parties, community gatherings! More murals, more support, etc!
1	Living space could be included with studio lease. Subsidizing the artist business with low interest loans and access to business services at a group rate.
1	If we want the best city, we have to keep income diversity in our premiere area. Not everything needs to luxury and upscale-- encourage diversity of housing by giving incentives to build decent, not luxury, housing.
1	Use of cooperatives, especially for studios. Many artists with small spaces, encouraging the clustering of of artists, much like the brewery district.
1	showcase more than once a month gallery nights; create more outdoor venues for artists to showcase their work and even make sales, etc.
1	increasing rents are forcing out several small business owners which reduces these creative assets
1	The best way to help local artists to thrive is visibility. I know that we have the "First Friday Artwalks" in Downtown that help that visibility, but it is also important for the city to help facilitate and encourage partnerships between local businesses and displaying the artwork of local artists. This helps both the business glam up its look and the artist to get their name out there and art sold. One of my favorite places to see art is at restaurants, bars, and breweries because you get a chance to better look at them while you enjoy another craft. I know this is just one way, but there are a lot of boutiques and specialty stores in downtown Fort Collins, and these would also be great places to facilitate partnerships local businesses and local artists. I would also like to possibly see an art show in Fort Collins. Many other places in Colorado have art shows, and it would be a great opportunity for both Old Town, the community, and local artists to come together and celebrate art. If we could combine that with local craft beer, we would have a really great event, like Crafts and Canvases, or something similar. It would be a great opportunity to combine two things that make Fort Collins a truly amazing city to live in.
1	This system of prioritizing things is tough and I am not sure it is the best way to parse our opinions. A lot of structural, urban design moves will achieve many of these things, but they have to be thought of comprehensively, not piecemeal.
1	Fort Collins already does a great job with this: E.g. Downtown Square re-design, art walk, festivals, etc. My suggestion would be for the city to continue to focus on infrastructure: Public transportation, restroom facilities (this one needs improvement), parking, and areas for cultural gatherings such as the re-designed square and Oak Street plaza.
1	create shared studio space for artists in empty spaces in the area. Keep rents reasonable so 'struggling' artists could afford it.
1	I like art, but I really have not liked the weirdly painted horses. (I do like the blue DIA horse though.) Do other people like these? Maybe you could have some kind of voting system to determine if people want certain works to remain.
1	We must advocate changes to the Colorado Condo Defects Law. Currently, the status quo makes it difficult for developers to build affordable-for-purchase units (condos). Condos are important because they create owned spaces and community engagement in different ways that for rent apartments do. The whole community should support legislative changes to make condo construction possible again.
1	Fort Collins has done an amazing job at showcasing art on utility boxes, art in public squares but it could be more incorporated in signage for businesses, venues, landmarks, etc.
1	Fund Streetmosphere! And keep up with the live music/entertainment in Old Town Square. Also create more opportunities for the public to be involved with art, maybe by creating interactive performing/visual art pieces. It would be amazing for the community to create something together!

1	partner with non-profits that promote the arts and provide workshop and working space to artists.
1	Spend more public money to support arts and culture. It comes back in future revenue if you have a thriving arts culture. Don't spend money supporting the richest billionaires in the world to rebuild a mall. Put that 50 million to use in our town rather than Bentonville, AR.
1	Primarily through encouragement and non-profit efforts rather than through increasing/expanding public funding programs. I support the existing Art in Public Places program, and love the existing art around town and look forward to seeing future art funded by that program as it exists today.
1	Fort Collins already does a fabulous job with this during the summer - 1st/3rd Friday walks, outdoor concerts, musical people playing on corners, etc.
1	Continue to make arts facilities a priority in the City budget. Give tax incentives and creative monetary support to new creative businesses. Encourage partnerships for businesses and cultural programs.
1	I think what's already happening with the open air pianos and corner jam sessions is a great start. Maybe have artists painting street scenes and historic buildings around old town where pedestrians can stop and enjoy the art as it's being created.
1	Don't forget the literary arts, not just visual. Have studio tours in May so as not to conflict with other beer/outdoor events. Studios are indoors so can have that during cold or rain.
1	Collaborating with arts organizations AND citizens. I'm aware of (annual I think) meetings between the city and some arts organizations but if you don't include the community you are missing the point. The Lincoln Center makes it very difficult for anyone wanting to support the arts...cost, rules, rude staff, lack of flexibility for and cooperation with non profits.
1	more access points into downtown for bikes from trails and other bike paths. More bike racks that are usable with U-locks.
1	Explore low rent buildings and facilities that cater to arts and culture non profits and for profits. Create affordable housing for artists that is income based. Support the visual arts so that they are not the last in line when reporting of the cities cultural assets are mentioned or when funds are allocated.

1	Stop raising rent, stopping bragging about the choice city. I grew up in a tiny town and I'm not resistant or opposed to growth can be overwhelming. Every takes ownership of their town, grocer, and so on...that feeling can get robbed with hyper growth.
1	Do away with the 3 unrelated rule. If people can live simply with one another in smaller spaces, allow them to. It's more affordable for struggling artists and others with limited means. As downtown gets more expensive, the artists will be among the first to seek more affordable spaces to live and do their work.
1	Create a public/private partnership for more gallery/sales space. Encourage businesses to expand public art.

New West Fest/Taste of Fort Collins do not promote art - it's frustrating to see booth after booth of direct-tv, comcast, etc. Advertise and let people know when there are art shows/exhibits. Many times I've done an art show and had very few people come because they were not aware of it.
1	The current scheme seems to be working, but if businesses find it difficult to thrive, the other pieces will fall of their own accord.
1	Give grants and rent breaks to downtown arts and culture businesses such as Canyon Concert Dance, the museums, art galleries, music studios, etc.
1	More spaces for large-format works, a gallery dedicated to new artists and/or a bazaar-type space for artists to sell their own works.
1	The easiest is to do priority 2 (make it more affordable). Beyond that, maybe have a space in downtown that is reserved for a local artist who doesn't already have a space in downtown and feature them and their work in that space for a period of a month to three months, with the local artist chosen at random.
1	Increased support for public spaces and parks, incorporate local art and artists into public spaces. Seems like the city is doing a good job in this direction already.
1	Affordable housing and space is becoming a huge issue in Fort Collins. We need to be a community that artists, teachers, and people of all economic backgrounds can afford to live and work in. How to accomplish that, I don't know...
1	Special pricing that is subsidized or capped for creative individuals or smaller groups. Discourage predatory rental prices and encourage patronage.
1	Reach out to artists and performers to make sure they are welcomed and accommodated into downtown events. For example, promoting upcoming theater season.
1	Continue the fairs and events that Fort Collins is known for. Continue the pianos and find fun new ways to showcase local talent.
1	More of what you are doing: utility box & piano painting, contests, signs, flags/banners. Encourage/promote/require displays in public spaces, such as the library. Provide money and requirements for this allotted are space when buildings are renovated or new construction. Require business to purchase/display for sale a certain percentage of local art? (Coffee shops and Rainbow already do this.)

1	using low income housing credits, with city, regional, state and national funding, you can create a city managed live-work art center. Talk to Artspace in Minneapolis, MN. They are the experts at doing this. Better yet, learn from Loveland and visit their newly opened ArtSpace!
1	It seems that many small, local businesses are having to move away from old town, because the property owners are doubling their rent. This is opening the path for corporate/chain business to take over downtown Ft Collins, which in turn is changing what is so great about Old Town.
1	Repurpose peripheral commercial space as artists lofts, studios. Zone to allow artists to live in their studio spaces
1	simply incorporate more art and design pieces in public areas such as along roadways, particularly near those that are not developed (like the south side of Vine along the railway.) Offer incentives to businesses to offer live music.
1	I feel like Fort Collins does a good job with many of these things already. For my top priority - we should find ways to reward people who have creative ideas, not discourage them from operating because they had a new idea that the city doesn't know how to accommodate. Maybe there could be a trial period for new uses, or some kind of flex place that offers a proving ground for new businesses (but less formal than an incubator) - like Prism Glassworks or other models in Denver.
1	We need more eventing space for artists. Please think about space near the airport: or by Horse and Drago. That is the old airport and can be developed into some cool art studios and big venue's like an old t- hanger.
1	In the numerous festivals, include area for local artists. Maybe have these areas be free or reduced cost. If a festival requires an entry fee, allow free access to artist area and possibly reduced or free entry to festival if you purchase an item from a local artist.

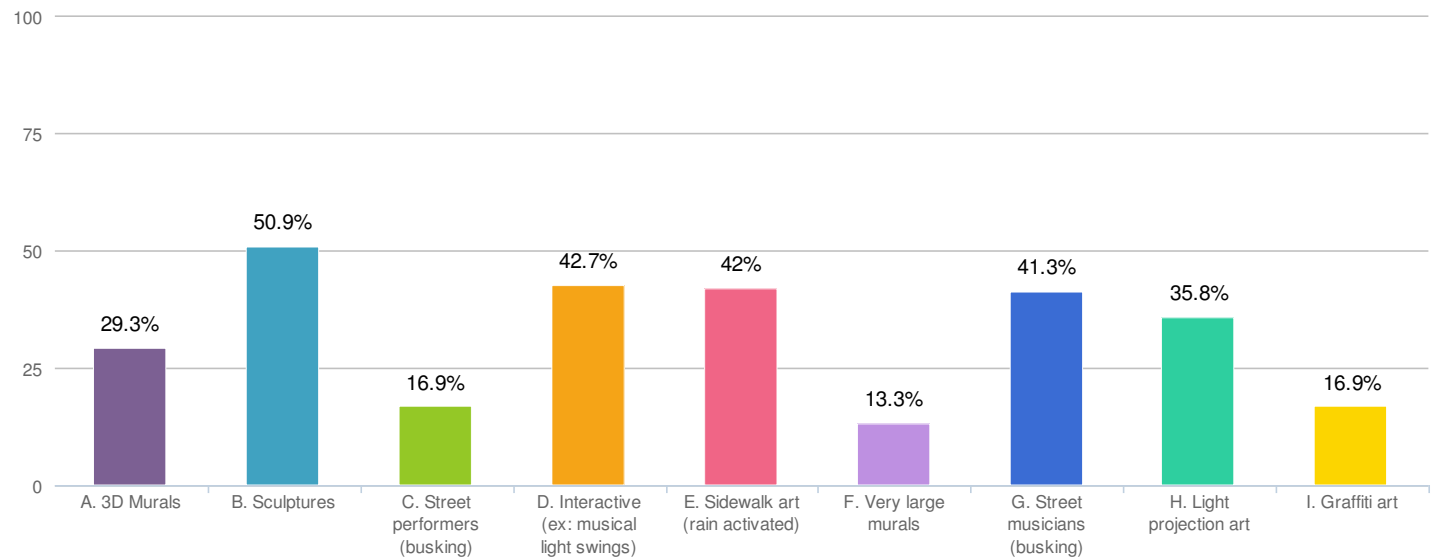

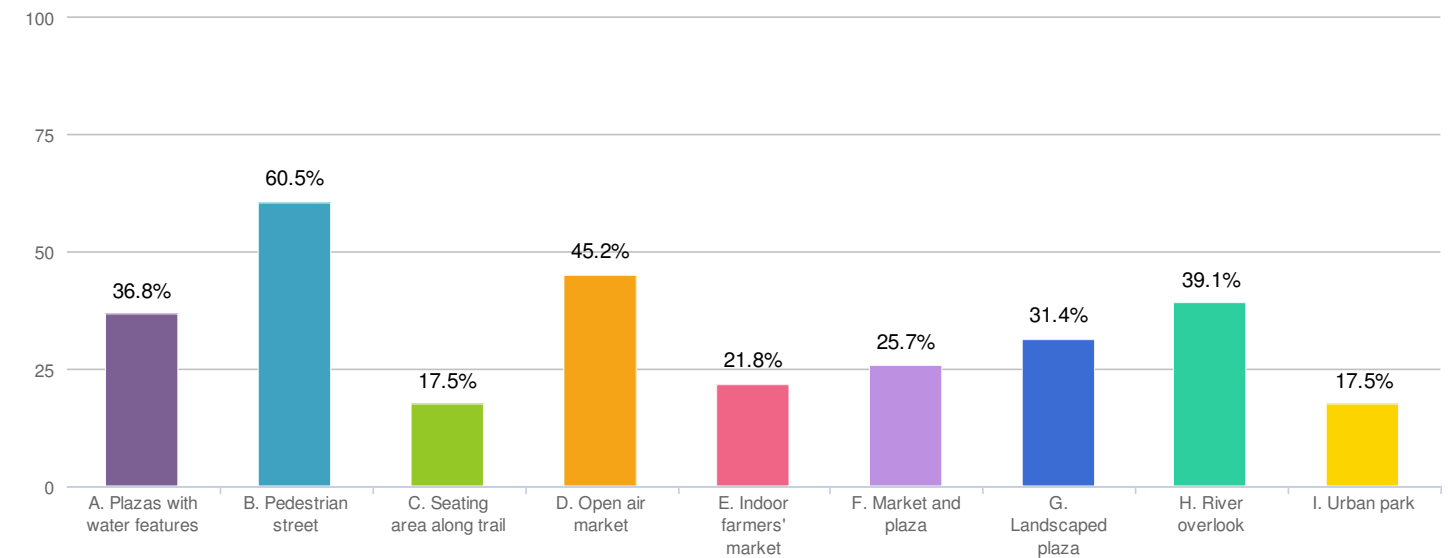

Count	Response
1	I think addressing problematic behavior and addressing the needs of the homeless go hand in hand. It's an issue that's is not being addressed. Having 100% of resources for homeless in old town and enabling an environment that allows for harassment of people walking down the street and arrogance toward business owners is at an exploding point. Tolerating it as an inevitable outcome of growth is ridiculous. Resources for homeless need to be disbursed throughout all of Ft Collins, not in one small area. Perhaps not allowing panhandling and offering ways to donate (like how you can pay your parking ticket right there on the street) to the programs that address homeless needs may give downtown a break and really direct those who have needs to where they need to be.
1	Don't coddle those misbehaving. Transient or not, criminal behavior needs to be dealt with strictly. I don't know if it is done now - but maybe the old fashioned method of "walking a beat" would create a stronger police presence downtown. If they are already doing that - great !
1	Would it be cheaper to have more community service officers specifically trained to monitor and intervene if necessary downtown. Seems cheaper than cops. The increase in bars adds to the already large crowd of intoxicated people.
1	Have convenient car "drop off" locations (parking spots) and encourage people to "foot" it from there by giving pedestrians priority in every way possible.
1	Expand the homeless shelter, spread word about actual location and how the homeless can get there (provide bus passes)
1	Move shelters away from old town. Build new shelters- one for families, one for individuals. Both should have resources for counseling of drug and alcohol abuse and psychological disorders. Both should work to assist with employment and education. Family shelters with children should have programs in place to ensure that the children have clothing, school supplies, lunches, availability of technology to do homework, and tutoring.
1	IMprove dangerous intersections for bikers and pedestrians on Jefferson and College (north and east parts)
1	Panhandling, homeless, and sleeping in parks are more prevalent than ever before. I do not feel as safe anymore downtown at night. This needs to be stopped and laws setup so this does not continue. I see people on major intersections all over town now, why? Is there not a law, if not there should be!
1	More bike dismount signs to indicate that you cannot ride on the sidewalks in downtown; more share the road symbols ("sharrows"), especially on College Ave. Signs that point to Poudre river trail and Spring Creek Trail.
1	I would favor a reduction in the number and scale of events. We are staunch downtown supporters, but avoid Old Town shops and restaurants during more and more weekends each year (because of events that making visiting downtown difficult or unpleasant, even if by bike or Max).
1	Alleyway improvements are a BIG step in the right direction. Unleash the fun and build aesthetic spaces with whimsical, interactive design. LOTS of public art!
1	I am not convinced that understanding (or not) is the problem. I do not bear ill feelings toward the homeless and I understand the complexity of this issue. People will need assistance and facilities like the Catholic Mission are important. However, the reality is that homeless congregate near these facilities, so if they are located in (or at the edge of) downtown, there will be homeless people around. The business community is understandably concerned about image and how visitors to Fort Collins perceive things. Homeless people do not necessarily pose a safety risk, but they are perceived as such. I would argue that college students in various stages of drunkenness are much bigger pests.
1	Keep sidewalks clean and wide. Perhaps prevent sidewalk space from being overly consumed by restaurant patios.
1	Dealing with the homeless population would help with many other issues. Suggest community task forces based on the ideas in The Power of Collaborative Solutions by Tom Wolff.
1	Space out the large outdoor events, both time-wise and location. Everything seems to happen either around Laporte and Howes or around Old Town Square. Some events on the south side of town would be REALLY nice. And events in the shoulder seasons would also be good. We're Coloradans, we can handle a little snow or rain at an event.

1	I would love to have an events area where things like New West Fest and Tour De Fat could happen without blocking up the whole downtown.
1	Have a walking and bike police presence on a beat that knows the community and can deture bad behavior before it is an issue. Provide safe rides home for those who party too hard.
1	This has as much to do with the rest of Fort Collins, but we need to make sure bike/pedestrian trails in the city reach everyone, especially those outside the Downtown area.
1	I think the city has been doing a great job with this, improving the alley ways, maintaining the medians etc. I don't want to see the character of the city change due to the growth. Parking will continue to be an issue and increased availability will need to be maintained.
1	I support programs for our local homeless families who are struggling. However, what I see is a growing number of transient people who come here and whose behavior reduces the quality of life. I have been followed by a transient man. I have had one transient man behave so aggressively on multiple occasions that I had to stop going to one of my favorite places. I support closing the Jefferson Street Park because it is a hangout that encourages unsafe behavior near downtown.
1	to continue to be the "choice city" as we grow we need to continually balance the appropriate number of staff to manage crime, criminal element and sense of safety
1	lower downtown speed limit to 25mph and enforce vigorously. Increase sidewalks width and crosswalks
1	Extend old town square and oak street plaza. Make additional pedestrian only pockets squares. Work to reduce homeless population so close to old town.
1	Avoid any projects that increase density. No more apartments. Better allocation of resources than buses that travel in straight lines.
1	So happy to see so much bike parking downtown. Keep up with that. I think downtown is great in with respect to walkability etc...

1	For such a great place, in our short time here we have witnessed many (not just several) issues with transients in and around downtown. Running the gauntlet.
1	through pedestrian officers, they would not have to be from the police department, but DBA security.
1	It's a very complicated issue. It will take a comprehensive community action group to help address the homeless population in Fort Collins. A city program for helping the homeless get jobs and housing would be great!
1	Parking. 2 hr parking is fine for College streets and a few neighboring streets such as Mason. But anything past mason should be open parking and not 2 hr. I work in old town and because there isnt any "close" parking available for the people that WORK in O.T. spaces are taken up new the stores by workers...not shoppers. ITs the 2 hr shuffle where employees come out and swap parking spaces to avoid a ticket. Also....large business that have parking available for their employees are EMPTY! 1St National for example, but there are several others, has 3 parking lots that stay empty. open them up for parking permits for others that work in old town. and if they have a parking lot why is there 2 hrs parking on the streets in front of them? (all the banks, courthouse etc.) anything west of Mason should not be 2 hr.
1	new construction that is in harmony with wide sidewalks, use of alleyways, spaces like oak plaza that invite people to linger. Parking garages. Pedestrian only spaces (linden street would be ideal)
1	Taking parking lanes or through-lanes and adding width to create sidewalks that are worth strolling on would be great.

1	Create more opportunities for pedestrian-scale transportation and safety of that, more small pocket experiences that encourage discovery
1	The City has to notify Affected neighborhoods about proposed changes. Notification has to come early in any process.
1	The top priority could be accomplished by creating more pedestrian friendly walk areas and also to have more parking to encourage walking in the downtown area.

1	It is too easy to be homeless here. People should be encouraged to work for a living. Move the shelters out of downtown and don't allow sleeping in public places. I'm not against homelessness, just laziness.
1	Dump the Ruby Payne paradigm and engage in critical analysis about systems that create large amounts of poverty and homelessness.
1	Move events to an alternate location. Everything in this City does not have to happen in Old Town.
1	No more petitioners accosting people on Mountain and College; homeless/vagrants not allowed near retail stores (just like smokers)
1	Programs to assist homeless/transient population. Do not allow performers not approved by the city, do not allow panhandling in the square

Eugene and Portland are on the right track actually, even if some people think genuinely supporting these people is "unsightly" or "enabling" (it's not at all!).
1	Downtown is useless during festivals. They pull business from small shops and create havoc in front of businesses. Keep festivals to a minimum, keep streets accessible by building underground parking.
1	Walkability is the key. When more areas are pedestrian oriented - it becomes low stress. Get out of the car folks - its OK.
1	- Clean, inviting MAX stations and walking routes from bus stops into downtown - Run buses on Sundays to enable more people to reach downtown without the need for a car or parking space - Trees and nature make spaces more inviting - Slowing traffic (and noise) on College Ave - New buildings should have unique architecture (not cookie cutter, like Mason St buildings) and be inviting to walk past (large windows) - Flowers in summer and holiday lights in winter are great for pedestrian atmosphere - Pavers in Old Town Square are nice, makes walking around the area feel a bit special - Building something else on top of large parking lots. 1	Funding proportional to growth in visitation, population, and development. So far, maintenance is good but a lot more impacts are being added and things will keep getting older.
1	Addressing homelessness issues would help with a lot of the other concerns. Suggest community task force based on the ideas in The Power of Collaborative Solutions by Tom Wolff.
1	No panhandling, no soliciting, no harassment of people sitting or dining outside. I'm an employee downtown, and I avoid eating my lunch in Old Town Square because I will be bothered at least twice and can't get the peace and quiet I'm seeking. It's not just the transient population, it's all of the nonprofits aggressively seeking donations too.
1	I don't know what you can do, but if laws were enforced and FC was not so attractive for "bums" they would come in less numbers. I have no problem helping those who want to better themselves, but are many who just want to sponge off of people. When they turn down food or a job, get rid of them. Like I said, I don't know how to accomplish that, but I am tired of being approached.
1	Relocate both of the shelters to the I-25 corridor, or at least implement a sober-only shelter rule at the Rescue Mission. And if that isn't possible, increase the amount of police patrols in the Jefferson Park/ Poudre trail area.

Substance abuse is an unfortunate by-product of the increasingly popular businesses downtown, and it seems to be supported by the city over the arts businesses. The alcohol businesses are driving more tourism and are profitable, but it is making downtown on a weekend night dangerous. I would encourage more variety of local businesses.
1	Signal controlled crosswalk at Linden and Walnut, larger crosswalks at College and Mountain. Downsize areas of restaurant patios on sidewalks.
1	The homeless don't bother me, it is the panhandling. Readdress the law that restricts panhandling anywhere in FC.
1	I would like to see old town square extended to incorporate Linden and associated side streets. This is a difficult and congested area for cars already.
1	Work with local nonprofits to care for the needs of the homeless community while providing safe places for them.
1	Better transportation benches less bars more a appropriate retail stores no specialty shops too many now
1	Strict limits on redevelopment which alters a building and a block's characteristic look, feel, skyline, height, and use should be implemented immediately. Variations from these limits should not occur until a thorough discussion is had in public forums. All parties interested in pursuing the modifications should be identified and their financial interests made clear.
1	Housing for the homeless population is much needed. Other cities have done this with great results. Ask them.
1	Wish I had a good answer. Have to balance the needs of the homeless with the safety of shoppers and businesses downtown. Possible new location for the Rescue mission - further from the core downtown?
1	Make blocks smaller and incorporate passageways through alleys to other parts of downtown (passageways may include seating/tables, murals, etc.)
1	Presence by police and upholding safety. This is done well today and should remain a top priority.
1	Work with Homeward 20/20, business owners, DBA, DDA, FCHA, local churches and religious non-profits and the Poudre Libraries to find ways of improving communication and working together towards sustainable goals for the homeless community. The recent Community Conversations on Homelessness were an excellent and productive step in the right direction.
1	I love the European attitude with pedestrian zones, outdoor dining, parks within a close distance and transportation (light rail but max is nice for now)
1	I am not versed in dealing with the homeless population. However, I have felt slightly threatened with my family along Linden heading out towards New Belgium, and in the area of Linden/Willow.
1	Close down more streets for pedestrian traffic, and move parking outside of downtown with shuttles or transit to downtown.
1	Why in the world don't we have a TV station? Talk to the WHOLE community--try posting at gathering places like recreation venues, including Aztlan and Sr. Center. More community info on FTC.gov. Does Fort Collins have a Facebook page?
1	Begin by not referring to a "homeless population" and instead talk about our neighbors who are experiencing homelessness. Next, create ways in which our neighbors who happen to be homeless can manage while they are homeless, so that groups like Homeless Gear can make meaningful connections and help our neighbors out of homelessness.

A lot of local people avoid downtown during festivals because of the noise, and disruption. Have more BALANCE of festivals in various areas in our town. Go to east side, or down south or partner more with CSU and use hughes stadium.
1	This requires tax support and/or a reshuffling of priorities to be able to maintain our downtown as the beautiful place it is. Public/private partnerships and distinct distribution of responsibilities for maintenance would also be important.
1	I never seem to know what's happening in the area...more posters would be good as posters are how I find out about many events.
1	Continue to keep cleanliness, potted/planted landscape, roadways, Christmas deco - all a top priority!
1	Often people that live in South FoCo don't seem to have a clue what is happening in Downtown, whether this is a large even like Taste of Fort Collins, or smaller, like a Farmers market. Appeal to all parts of the city.
1	Parking! It can take quite a bit of time to figure out where to park (with events even more). I have three small kids and to go to dinner, we have a limited time before one of the melts down. This is the main reason we avoid old town.
1	Homeless and public bathroom situation at oak and college needs to be addressed - drug deals in the open under law firm canopy and turns visitors off to old tow
1	The panhandling is getting out of hand. There are already plenty of resources for people so I don't think we need more. We just need to stop allowing this.
1	Identify areas that can expand into pedestrian only areas. Could another Oak St similar park be created?
1	Open shelters AWAY for Old Town. Why do we feed and house all our homeless in Old Town? Old Town is the jewel of Fort Collins. To keep Old Town safe for families and events, the homeless need to be moved.
1	There are many parts of downtown where the pedestrian light is much shorter than the motorist light. So some peds get caught standing at the intersection because there's a solid red hand, only to find that the light stayed green for another 20 or 30 seconds... more than long enough to have crossed. Those need to be fixed. Also, some lights don't automatically change for peds, leaving them to decide between crossing at a green, while the red hand is showing, or pushing the walk button and possibly having to wait a full cycle before there's crossing approval.
1	Convene monthly, ongoing dialogues, inviting all in the community to connect with each other, including , houseless folks, service providers, & others willing to attend.
1	Show movies and local documentaries which shine light on how people get to be in those situations and how local business can provide training as to give homeless people valuable skills with which they'd be able to apply for applicable jobs in the area; and furthermore bolster community pride through action and awareness.
1	Schedule events on a monthly basis. Large events first - no more than 2/month (at the VERY most). Medium next ~ 1-2/month. And small ones last as fill in. Small ones might even be able to be held concurrently with medium events if the downtown area were properly utilized. The downtown area really needs EMPTY WEEKENDS where nothing scheduled so the locals can enjoy their own town in the summer!!

1	parking garages have helped reduce cars circling to find parking. provide safe passage by foot and bike. limit cruising. It's fun for kids but loud, and rude for other's. It also really pollutes the air at night.
1	Primary need is affordable housing. Also need a greater understanding in the community -- there are systemic issues resulting in homelessness. And, people do not want to be homeless. Even if someone denies access to housing, there's usually a reason behind it -- severe mental illness, pride, the feeling that someone else needs it more, etc.
1	Seek to find real resources to help our homeless. Having them move from shelter to shelter doesn't seem like a solution that is working and then they end up loitering and giving the appearance of an unsafe area.
1	We have to find a way to control the eyesore. Focus groups and more funding is needed. Move housing shelters and facilities near the Detention Center near the Prospect/Timberline area.
1	Keep beautifying all of the alleys! I think they are one of the best aspects of Fort Collins (encourages you to stay off main roads) - would love to see this initiative keep going! Also, main side streets of College (like Mason, Remington) could be more attractive for walking). More public/local art also makes the pedestrian experience a great one (something I think the city is already doing really well).
1	Remove the problem from the parks. Hold the homeless people to the same standard as the community. Dont allow loitering and overnight sleeping. Make it uncomfortable for homeless people and don't encourage them to stay in town.
1	keeping events such as brewfest out of old town and keeping businesses safe is great by moving the event a wee bit out of old town. our downtown businesses work hard, and are a huge part of our community. their hard work should not be superseded by an once a year event.
1	While sidewlak patios at restaraunts/bars contribute greatly to a sence of vibrancy, make sure they don't encroach so much onto the right of way to impede pedestrian traffic (e.g. the "smoker's gauntlet" on the north side of the 100 block of W. Mountain, and the squeeze play on the northeast corner of Mountain and College as folks head towards Old Town Square). Also, complete the project that the bike-pedestrian coordinator told me some ten or twelve years ago was under way--to make all traffic signals between downtown and campus give an automatic walk signal (three I use frequently that still require pushing a button to get a walk are LaPorte/College, LaPorte/Mason, and Mason/Mulberry).
1	Stop criminalizing homelessness, allow those without homes to panhandle, and allow people to rest in old town. For crying out loud we have restaurants with entrees costing \$30 or \$40. Anyone who can afford to eat or shop in Old Town can afford to give a few dollars to someone less fortunate. Furthermore they should not expect those less fortunate to be "invisible".
1	More, better trained security / police presence. Police downtown are useless if they're just shopping and not dealing with issues as they arise.
1	making sure that high standards of behavior are encouraged perhaps with community officers or downtown policing.

1	Most of the time my experiences have been harmonious but some over drinking and large groups of homeless can make the experience tense at times. Helping the homeless is great but inviting more might not be the best solution. Make sure the homeless get to help out to 'earn' their assistance.
1	institute a code of decorum or code of conduct that all residents, guests, and visitors are expected to adhere.
1	My wife is pregnant and we love walking downtown. Safety is my number one priority for my family. If we don't feel safe downtown we simply would stop going.
1	Walking is the most fundamental form of transportation. the installation of a number of engineering treatments such as intersection safety cameras, pedestrian countdown timers, speed reader boards, and corner bulges, among other things. The City can form an Active Transportation Advisory Committee to advise on matters that encourage and enhance walking as a means of transportation, recreation and health.
1	pedestrian spaces are already quite good but parking in garages should be encouraged more through reduced rates and more free days
1	Partner with area mental health providers and social service providers to develop outreach that can meet the needs of homeless individuals. Don't have an "us and them" mentality. We are all human beings.
1	We usually find out about events through the weekly Coloradoan Ticket insert, and it's often too late to fit it into our plans. Raise the profile, please.
1	If the problematic behavior is alcohol infused, see if a friend can safely remove the offender from the area. Otherwise, the offender can be taken to a drunk tank for a night. The penalties shouldn't be too severe provided the behavior is more annoying than it is dangerous. Dangerous behavior like violence and threats should incur prosecution to the full extent of the law.
1	With the proposed increase in student population at CSU and the rising transient population, a strong security presence would help keep the Down Town family friendly.
1	It amazes me how we treat our homeless and transient populations here. Please look at the Denver Public Library as an example of how to come alongside this community and help them out. Reach out to QUALIFIED mental health professionals, and try to help these people instead of running them out of town.
1	Fort Collins is a growing city, and from the looks of the housing market, it's not going to be stopping soon. So I would like to see more planning going towards the people we will have in Fort Collins in 5, 10 and 20+ years, not the population we have today. We need to be more mindful about how many people will be coming to Fort Collins, not the ones we have already, because I foresee that if we don't plan correctly, we will be answering these same surveys often down the road. So, I would like the city to be proactive in their thinking, not reactive.

1	Provide a homeless shelter just east of downtown that can accommodate more people. Motorcycles, cars and trucks that are excessively loud should be ticketed.
1	I think we could explore the possibility of enforcing loitering codes or limiting the amount of time allowed for sitting/lying in Old Town.

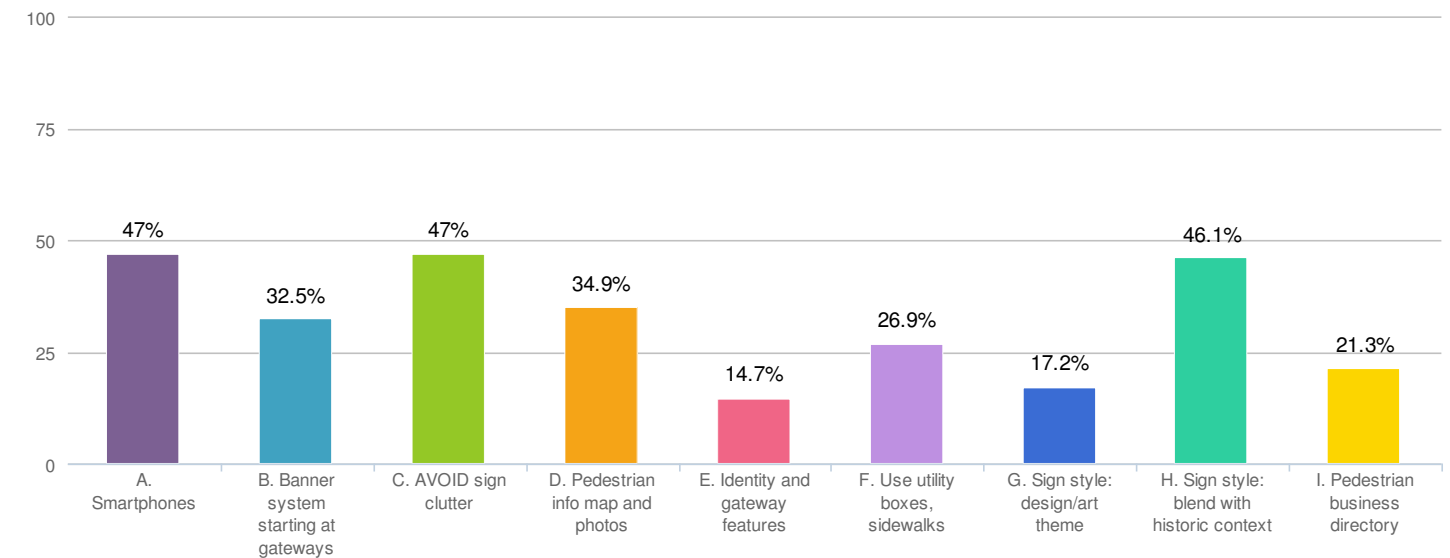

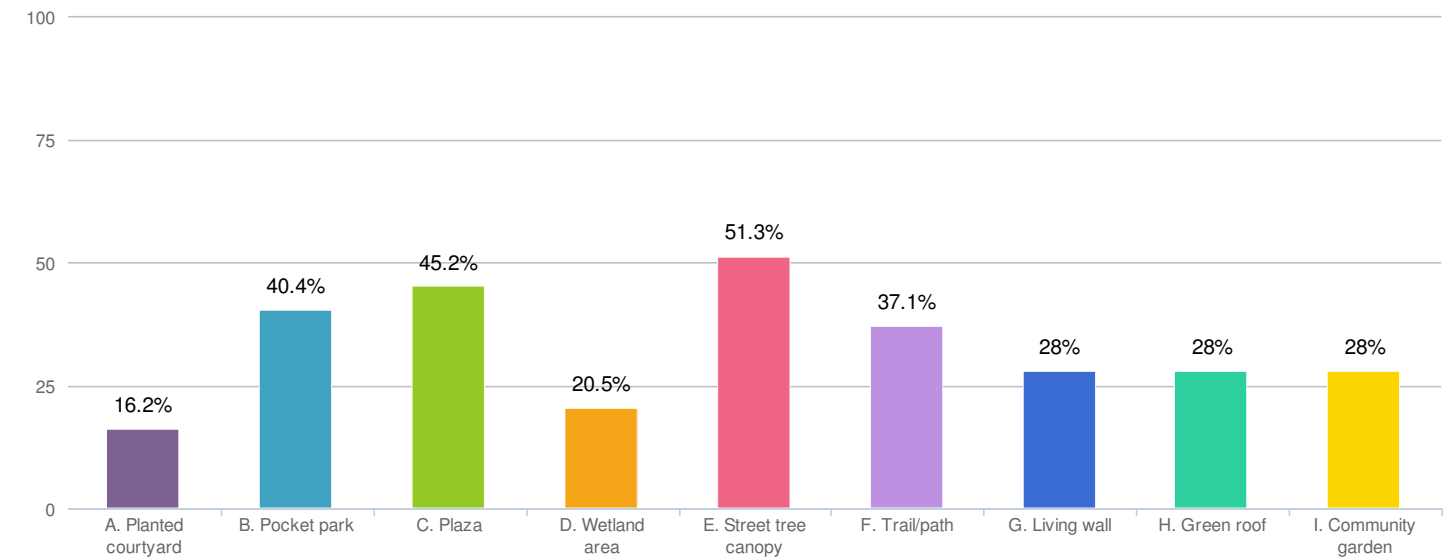

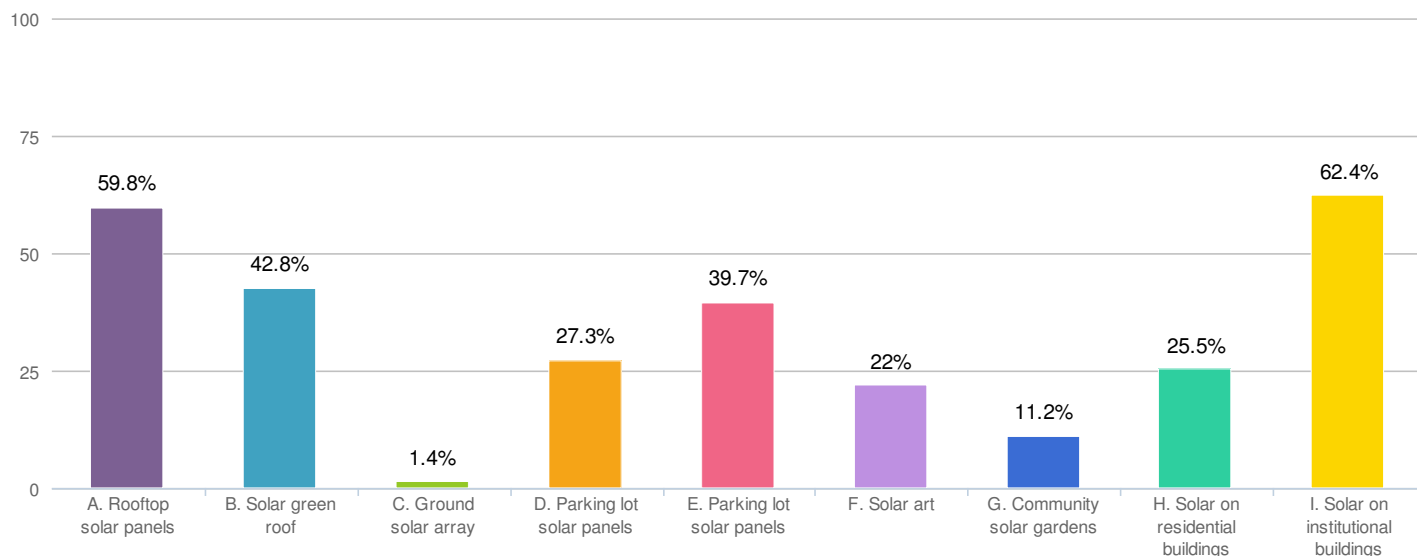

1	Don't bring in outside chains that have greater monies and resources. Continue to support and promote through fairs, weekly and indoor markets, and outside music venues local farmers, artists, artisans, Ft. Collins' based food trucks, and stores which sell locally produced products and services.
1	I think growth is great, but not at expense of the community. This is one time where go big or go home is not appropriate. Minimize risks, support those who are there, do not cause your foundation to abandon downtown.
1	Encourage development with taste, embrace the government/private partnerships to leverage tax expenditures. Some eggs will get broken.
1	Commercial real estate rent is through the roof, and large chunks of property seem to be owned by just a handful of people. This is a form of monopoly that's strangling new businesses. The city could invest in purchasing, redeveloping and then renting out run-down properties to help create some competition. That includes areas just outside the immediate downtown area, for instance north college past LaPorte up to the river and over to Cherry.
1	No idea, as I am not an economist. Market forces result in higher rents, property values and driving out local businesses. Get nationally recognized experts involved in this problem.
1	Do away with the 3 unrelated rule. Establish other mechanisms to protect rental properties from damages, if that is the primary concern.

We don't mind if they want to set up shop anywhere else in town at regular rates. But if they want to be in the heart of downtown, they need to pony up a little extra.

1	In order to keep our downtown unique it would be best to have local and independent businesses inhabiting the downtown space available. Moreover, design standards, building codes and excessive project delays add significant costs that are not disclosed nor discussed. When do we get to talk about cost-effectiveness, suitability and sustainability of requiring 'world-class' standards?
1	Short of legal restrictions, I don't know. Several businesses have been subjected to extreme rent increases in the last few years and housing prices in and around the downtown area are astronomical.
1	I don't want to see unattractive, unpopular shops setting up business, but I'm not aware of the approval process. Business with well laid plans shouldn't have to overcome unreasonable conditions for approval.
1	Rent-controlled properties, small business grants & loans, events focused on local, independent small businesses.
1	It is really not an issue about creating new incentives but rather an issue of City Leadership not helping or taking all incentives for themselves. The TIF should not be the only incentive that the City uses. The City leaves more development incentives on the floor due to lack of leadership from the managers office instead of helping apply creatively with businesses.
1	I would not make approval processes easier. Whomever approved the Woodward project was after the tax money and did not give a thought to the congestion of traffic, trains and inadequate street lanes.
1	Rent controlling? I have no idea, but if Downtown turns into anywhere-ville with only chain operations, we WILL be anywhere-ville.
1	For projects that are designed to meet current adopted code minimize public input and staff delays.
1	Raise taxes on land and reduce taxes on buildings. This encourages people to put nicer buildings on less land. Also we need to make it easier to build tall buildings.
1	The city needs to buy up at least 20% of the historic buildings in Old Town to provide lower rents for the small mom and pop shops. You need to tell Pat Striker and Brian Thomas this is not their town!!!!!!
1	Provide rent breaks and tax incentives for small businesses to be able to afford downtown rental space for their businesses.
1	Look at existing abandoned buildings to see if they are adequate to reuse or build on. Stop building on open space!!!

1	By using some of the DDA revenue to do so through advertising and possible "grants". Also, number two should be explored.
1	Make businesses easily accessible and available with lots of bike parking and local products. Allow for as much arts and culture as possible across the cultural and SES spectrums of Fort Collins. Make some areas pedestrian with ways for people with disabilities to use the area.
1	Let's look at what price points can help us all prosper, without participating in the nationwide predatory rental and housing market prices that leave housing stability out of reach for our middle class and working poor. We are in a position to do a better job than so many other areas of the country. Perhaps a length of residency clause, or a tiered pricing for those that work for locally owned businesses? I am certain we can find a better balance between prosperity for landlords and housing stability for lower income (deeply needed) residents.
1	Keep fees nominal, streamline process, and encourage actual density rather than placating the no-growth argument that only serves to inflate prices and rents.
1	Group marketing of independent, local, and small businesses to both local and tourist traffic. If Fort Collins *isn't* just like everywhere else, then that's a big draw.
1	Many hands make less work. It is in the best interests of both the town and the businesses to improve the area, and the businesses have a better sense of what is needed I think. The city can help businesses to engage their customers and get input, and then assist businesses in coordinating projects and aid in financing. Ground up rather than top down.
1	I have no idea. The population of Fort Collins continues to increase. The Max is okay, but it only goes North-South, so many people still have to drive or bike to it and there are not enough bike spots on the Max buses. Also, not many people want to ride bikes in the winter. It definitely a major problem.
1	For small businesses other than bars and restaurants the high rents are squeezing out stores that benefit downtown and Old Town. Some type of strategy that would subsidize rents or some other type of financial incentive that would make it more likely that downtown could have the whole range of stores, including grocery, clothing, etc., but with prices low enough that a regular person would shop downtown
1	Help retailers own the spaces their businesses are in, rather than paying ever-rising rents. Provide incentives for local businesses and/or regulations that make it harder for non-Fort Collins or non-Colorado chains to locate downtown. Lululemon may feel innocuous, but it's a sign the tide is turning downtown, and not in the direction the community seems to want.

1	Programs that promote transit use. Providing free or discounted transit passes. Priority parking for carpools or vanpools. Shuttle services from nearby transit stations or satellite parking lots. Ride-matching services that help people identify potential carpool or vanpool partners.
1	garages required for ALL new building, especially commercial businesses that have many employees that take up all the street parking. My street, Mathews, from College south to Olive is fully parked up by 8 am by people commuting/working downtown. The proposed retail /office building on Mathews and Mountain should have underground parking required. With green space, rooftop solar, and art. Just saying things could all be accomplished together.
1	reduce the number of isolated lanes. Reduce the number of restricted parking spaces for vehicle type or bicycle type or motorcycle type. Reduce the separations between walking and riding and driving. Allow people to access downtown via whatever mode they deem appropriate.
1	create special zones throughout downtown; bike zones for parking and securing bikes; create max incentives that get folks on the bus to reduce cars needing to be driven downtown; look at creating another parking ramp so the large events have at least ONE MORE parking option.
1	We need huge bike racks, at new west feat every pole fence and tree had bikes locked to it. I think as a community Fort Collins is really good about biking to events downtown, now we just need room to park!
1	make intersections on the north and east parts of Old Town more pedestrian and bike friendly so that car/truck drivers understand that they have to go very slowly and carefully because the priority is a good pedestrian and bike experience. (I'm thinking about the intersections with College and LaPorte, Maple/Jefferson, Cherry, etc. And the intersections with Jefferson and Mountain, Linden, etc.)
1	I mentioned previously, many people need a car to get around. Not everyone can bike and not everyone can, or wants to use public transportation and should not be made to feel guilty for that choice. Adequate parking for personal vehicles is needed and should be considered very important.
1	By focusing on #2 and #3. Alternative transit to the downtown area should be a priority (connecting bus and transit routes). Perhaps linking parking structures that are on the outskirts of downtown to the shopping areas with shuttles could work.
1	bike parking with theft protection, such as in a parking grauge with security. have better bus system with routs off of Max
1	Expanding bus routes/hours to accommodate the lower-income population who tend to work early/late hours & are often located on the fringes of this city.

Count	Response
1	Use a percentage of auto taxes or public transportation subsidies to start prioritizing healthy active living in the heart of downtown. Eliminate parking and convert roads from auto to cycling and public transport only. Walking and biking will discourage the obesogenic society in we currently reside. Develop a "park and bike" or "park and bus" to get to downtown. What about a tram/trolley down College Ave. Might get rid of 60% of the car traffic. After living in Switzerland, I see just how wonderful this system works! Public transport, cycling lanes and cycle-friendly buses/trams and in retail locations pedestrian only.
1	As opportunities through development present themselves, we should form private/public relationships to improve intersections, build more bike infrastructure, improve sidewalks, bike trails, and create a positive flow of pedestrians, bikes, skateboards, and cars through Downtown.
1	All the other items will work to reduce parking demand. Basically, parking should be inconvenient for visitors.
1	Create more on-street bike parking, like the red units in front of places like the Rio. Create whole areas for bike parking like at Equinox. More sharrows and bike boxes. More roundabouts. Less car parking.
1	Already seems pretty good. Since I live only several blocks from Old Town and usually bike or walk downtown, this is not as big an area of concern for me.
1	I would actually take the bus if all buses ran every 30 mins (or dare I say every 15 mins). Having most of them run once an hour is too inconvenient to justify using. Keep moving towards increased frequency (like the MAX coming every 10 mins) and increase the amount of bike racks on every bus (including the MAX!). Focus on making public transportation as fast and convenient as driving a car as much as possible! A lot more people will use it!
1	Car friendly design encourages driving. Pedestrian/bike friendly design encourages those. And it is hard to please both, because cars benefit from more space (for parking spots and driving lanes) whereas bikers and walkers benefit from shorter distances (i.e. between destinations, no large streets to cross etc). If anything, put cars on the periphery and increase density in the center.
1	Give priority to bikes and pedestrians downtown by having wide/clear bike lanes and sidewalks, have separate signals for bikes/pedestrians (e.g. allow pedestrians to cross a busy intersection diagonally by stopping traffic from all directions at the same time), create more streets where buses, bikes and pedestrians are allowed but no cars such as in downtown Denver.
1	Talk of reviving the trolley, or if that is really not feasible, a free loop bus downtown would help. Also, although they aren't downtown, better grid connections to Max at Prospect, Drake and Horsetooth might encourage more use of Max.
1	We have great north/south biking lanes on Remington, Howes, Whedbee and Loomis. There is not one safe east/west biking lane in old town and the diagonal parking is extremely dangerous for bikers. Perhaps on the south side of Olive Street the diagonal parking could be turned into a two way bike lane that is protected from traffic. Biking east/west downtown is not safe, especially for kids.
1	Increase bike lanes and bike safety signals. We only have one bike signal at Mason and Laurel. More Bike Parking in old town- means less cars. If you are targeting affordability- note: it is cheaper to own a bike than a car- so focus on bike parking, and bike lanes. Look at other cities: Seattle, Vancouver, BC, Minneapolis.
1	Parking in old town is pretty good with the garages. But parking near the Lincoln center is awful. Most of the time that parking is needed there, the post office is closed and their lot sits empty with signs about towing. It is STUPID to leave this resource empty.
1	Remove cars from additional sections of downtown? Add street features to decrease speeds and increase driver attention. Also, it is tough for visitors/new folks to find the mostly adequate public parking.
1	Continue to move towards cutting-edge bicycle infrastructure improvements like separated bike lanes, green striping, etc. The Mason corridor and trail are great for getting around town on a bike - more major bicycle-friendly thoroughfares like this are needed in the long term to transition away from automobiles, especially in our smaller community.
1	See comment about bike racks above. Possibly lockers available for day-use only. Some intersections are still lousy for bicycles.

1	Improve main routes to access downtown. Extend Linden/Redwood north, improve Vine, improve North Lemay, improve Lincoln Ave. If all of these were build up adequately traffic would be relieved in other areas and allow easy access while also helping walking and biking aspects. A new road connecting Lemay/Vine to Turnberry would promote northern growth as well.
1	better connections to regional transport need to be established and information made available, to be able to ride from MAX to DIA with 2-3 connections in 2-3 hours would be Amazing.
1	Transit passes for downtown employees; employee dedicated parking on perimeter of downtown; extending easy, 10 minute service on other corridor connecting Old Town (Lemay/Taft); More bike parking close to businesses; Creative crossings for 287
1	i think the parking in old town is adequate. my family has had only a few instances of needing to drive around and around for parking.
1	Retail & residential development around a parking structure to hide it and provide connection to residents and customers.
1	Incorporate bike lanes - particularly East/West across downtown. Enhance crosswalks for pedestrians - all-walks or leading pedestrian signals. Reduce confusion and conflicts at intersections with clear signage, good signals, and parallel routes for particularly busy/dangerous intersections or roads.
1	Mason is a problem. Sharrows aren't cutting it. Cyclists continue to hug the door zone, which is dangerous and uncomfortable. Parking should be removed from Mason and full width bike lanes installed. Crossing the river is also a problem. Mulberry is being improved, but other options pretty much suck for peds and cyclists.
1	This is a huge priority for the city because of the plans CSU is has to bring the stadium to campus. There is barely enough parking it seems for some of the bigger events downtown, let alone for the campus stadium. The president of the school doesn't seem to think that adequate parking is a priority, so I think the city should, especially since many who will go to the game will likely venture downtown afterwards. To accomplish this goal, there are many parking lots that would serve well if they were converted into parking garages. There is also a few buildings and businesses in and around downtown--many on the north side of College--that are vacant and could be converted into more parking, park-and-ride and bike exchange (where people can park and then rent a bike to ride into Downtown and leave it at another "bike stop", and then ride another one back when they leave Downtown) locations. These would be beneficial in increasing accessibility to downtown and ensuring more than adequate parking for downtown.
1	Make more arterial routes that radiate from downtown in ALL directions. We need more than just the Mason Trail. Connect the power trail. A new trail from SW Fort Collins.
1	obvious, easy walkable paths from transit stops to town center. East west connections for busses.
1	More bike trails across the entire city with easy access to downtown, combined with increased access to bus/Max.
1	20+ years later we will thank ourselves for inventing in public transportation. Fort Collins and Colorado in general.
1	I know people will drive to downtown, so there has to be parking. But I'd HATE to see more space dedicated to cars! So to encourage people to use Max: reduce fares in evenings? Be sure there's parking at Max stops in the south end? Expand Max service to more of the city? (doesn't HAVE to be on dedicated lanes! Just more inviting busses!) AND to encourage those who do drive to use the parking structures: is it possible to make them free on weekends?
1	Repeal the TOD overlay. It's ridiculous to assume new, or expanded facilities will not beget the use of vehicles, whether necessary or by virtue. That said, there is an economic interest to the City for any such development so parking requirements should not be borne entirely by the private sector.
1	Once again, the train traffic through downtown Fort Collins is an issue because all modes of transportation are disrupted by the train route.

Count	Response
1	Infrastructure that supports walking and biking. Car free or low speed, low volume routes for bikes. Safe pedestrian crossings.
1	better bike lanes & pedestrian crossings, better traffic signalization, more enforced pedestrian zones, "green" bike lanes like on Laurel and College, more bike racks,
1	Making other modes easier will reduce the vehicle demand because bicycling and walking will be the clear choice.
1	Get Max to run 7 days a week. Forget about the other lines for Sunday, but Max should be a high priority, especially now that the mall is not functional, Make downtown a destination to eat, walk, and shop. Let the mall be for shopping in and out. It would be great if there were connections out, say to city park, Martinez park, fort fun, and the breweries.
1	Get rid of the damn train. The Max is not much better. Why not smaller shuttles that are free and run every 15 minutes from parking areas to downtown?
1	Encourage the development of genuine TOD style projects (zero parking!) near MAX. Pay little attention to those voices who oppose infill since they were not part of the City Plan discussion and have little understanding of our higher community goals of reduction in VMTs and greater affordability.
1	Are you not paid to find that out? Don't convert Fort Collins in a second Boulder and stop lying to us that growth pays its way.
1	Keep adding designated bike lanes, repair curbs and cracked sidewalks, turn alleys into walking corridors with lights, plantings, and art.
1	make it so people ALL across Ft Collins can get downtown such that getting in their car is NOT always the fastest, most convenient, and cheapest option.
1	First fund connecting sidewalkLs throughout the downtown area; second make bike transportation a priority by having well connected direct routes that are SAFE to travel!
1	Late night bus services would be great so that fewer people drink drive when going out in old town. Also, it would be great to have Lyft in town to compete with Uber.
1	For me, connectivity to the MAX on prospect ave. is a big deal. The fact that Prospect between Shields and College is such a snarl of traffic is a problem for getting my family to the station. I suggest implementing the prospect corridor plan and reducing the speed limit to 30.
1	Great job on the Max so far! Expand the Max grid so that it is more accessible for those commuting to downtown.
1	More bike lanes, protected bike lanes, sharrow symbols; make the mason corridor a bike/bus route only (like it is south of Laurel); expand the square to Linden Street, making it a pedestrian only street as well
1	Some vacant lots should be turned into parking garages, not more businesses. Many businesses have a hard time staying open as is, there isn't a need to open more until parking is sufficient.
1	Circulator shuttles, more bike share locations, and other modes that allow people to quickly cover short distances. Consider new/different vehicle types - free sponsored pedicabs, rubber tire trolley that follows historic trolley routes and beyond, etc. While I didn't list it as my top priority, improving safety and comfort for bikes throughout the downtown is critical. A lot of people seem to think that old town is the most bikable area of the community, but I disagree. It's much easier and safer to get around in neighborhoods and around campus than it is near Mountain & College, along Canyon Ave, along Vine, etc.
1	Pay parking could reduce the amount of "roaming" people do for parking spaces and increase safety
1	Add Sunday Transfort and MAX bus service. Light rail service is needed in Fort Collins and the Front Range. Reduce the frequency of freight trains passing through Fort Collins.

Count	Response
1	Fort Collins has a 4-lane truck-route/highway funneling directly through downtown via Jefferson and Riverside. Additionally, there are multiple train lines that bisect downtown. From a pedestrian perspective, all of these are sections of downtown that feel sometimes dangerous, often chaotic, and always inconvenient. Please come up with short- and long-term solutions to re-route through-traffic on Hwy 14 so that it does not continue to be a blight on downtown Fort Collins.
1	Stop letting buildings be built which do not include parking for all tenants, residents, and customers.
1	"Get rid of pedestrian bulbs and intersection islands" Major renovation to tear these out. Revisioning of priorities to reflect reality.
1	Encourage use of downtown garages and strictly enforce parking time frames to eliminate people parking for many hours at a time in the same spot.
1	More pedestrian only zones and bike lanes on all streets (even if parking must move to garages). Shuttle bus system to move people around downtown.
1	Reduced parking demand can be accomplished by running an adequate bus system (which this city does not); buses every 15 minutes on arterials feeding to the MAX line would be a great start. Incentives, like discounts or 'freebies' at downtown establishments for using public transit could motivate some people.
1	I'm not sure how feasible this is, but I'd love to see an underground bypass for cars on College. This would open up the streets for walking.
1	Redesign streets to limit through traffic. Separate car and bike/ped routings to downtown. Create space and capacity for public transit and bicycles to safely maneuver.
1	Bus routes from outlying areas of town, ie., LaPorte, etc. The bus stop that is nearest to my home is on LaPorte and Taft and is still a 5-6 mile drive just to get to the bus stop and then ... where do I park?
1	No more apartments or offices which don't provide their own parking. More 2 hour parking zones so that Otterbax employees don't take them all.
1	Walking in the downtown area is mostly easy, other than congested areas with patios. Biking can be difficult due to traffic and parking and it would be nice to have more protected lanes as well as the possibility of restricted riding lanes in some of the areas where riding is currently not allowed. Even more bike racks.
1	Re-evaluate the bus routes to incorporate express routes. MAX doesn't serve people living north of the city or southeast. Bike lanes/paths are not linked in the north or southeast. Realize that there are more than college students living in Fort Collins.
1	One hour and half-hour cycles for bus routes are NOT acceptable. Inconvenience precludes citizen usage.
1	I get downtown via bike or car. When i drive, parking is always a challenge. Bike routes in old town are not great. Improved bike routes and parking would increase my frequency of visiting down town.
1	This may be too burdensome but anticipate the next 50 years and potential growth. if we could lease the tracks along mason and have 3 or 4 major stops i.e downtown, university, mall, and harmony
1	Parking, parking, parking. The parking garages that were added are terrific! I love the fact that they are affordable. Add more or make them bigger!
1	I think the cities pursuit of Roundabouts is good. I also like how the city has been making entire lanes bike friendly.
1	Expand the existing bike lane and trail network. Create protected/separated bike lanes on major streets. Reduce width of busy roads to slow the traffic. Provide better options to reach Old Town by bike and on foot from the north (Linden is missing sidewalks). Replace car parking with bike parking.

Count	Response
1	It's challenging to navigate downtown by bike--and by that I mean the entire large downtown area described by the map at the beginning of the survey. I bike a lot. North/south works pretty well by particular routes. East/west is difficult. Lights are timed badly for bikes on all routes. Plan bike routes for all directions. Re-time lights (Mountain/Howes-and-Mason are especially hard to negotiate safely.) Protected lanes. No, we don't need to ride bikes on the downtown sidewalks. But we do need to have ways to get to destinations in the area. Walking's a bit better.
1	Have better bus service going east west along mountain or Laporte. Even better would be to utilize the trolley as a mode of transportation!
1	Improve pedestrian walkways as downtown expands. Add bike lanes (protected if possible) and plenty of bike parking
1	I don't think the parking situation is really that bad yet. Parking validation stamps from all stores/restaurants for the parking garages would be nice. And I think it would be nice to give people who work in Old Town a place to park for more than two hours that at the same time does not have a per hour fee. It would be nice, but I can understand why it isn't a priority.
1	Automated bike sharing is something I've heard may be a possibility recently. Look to other municipalities around the country and learn from them.
1	better signage to get you to the modes of transportation; colorful walkways that get you to MAX and to bike library; similar to hospitals having floor directions to get you around, etc.
1	I mentioned before the time it takes to drive in and around downtown is significantly slowed due to the amount of street lights.
1	good inexpensive public transportation a hop on and off free shuttle bus businesses and residential units must provide some parking for employees and guest re shuttle bus or underground parking
1	Actively discourage car usage in favor of public transport. I know the city doesn't want to expand service area and frequency of buses, but if you build it they will come! Let people trade in their cars if necessary.
1	Eliminate parking spots in old town and redirect all cars to parking structures or lots. Replace parking space with expanded sidewalks and bike lanes.
1	Have MAX lines coming in from the West (Elizabeth Street?) and from the Southeast areas of Fort Collins. Add late night/weekend transit service.
1	Our entire world view regarding transport is broken. I don't know how to correct that and move to a place where we have the patience and flexibility to use options other than cars.
1	limit street parking but double the number of handicap per block, move bike racks off sidewalks direct cars to parking structures thus improving car traffic flow on DT College Ave (US287).
1	Physically separate bike paths. Where on-street parking exists, make it reverse-in diagonal parking.
1	Coordinate MAX and bus schedules with the business hours of downtown so it's an option. Encourage businesses to reward customers who walk, ride transit or bike. Provide plenty of safe bike parking.
1	Continue addition of bike lanes to streets. Put pedestrian crossing lights (similar to those around Mountain/Remington) on other high traffic intersections (Cherry & Mason)
1	Frankly, MAX seems not very useful. Initially I recall it being presented in a trial run and then changing up the connecting bus routes (in East/West directions) to make downtown more accessible using MAX. Until this happens, my guess is that MAX will not be under-utilized! :(
1	Think about generating revenue through parking meters, or increasing your parking cost at the garages. Then take the money and have more bike parking. It is crazy to focus on affordable housing in downtown- when the people who want affordable housing- will be on bikes or walking. They will also be using bus or car share.

Count	Response
1	Better connection times between bus routes-people that plan these routes should actually take them-they would be surprised at how poorly they connect. Having to wait 45 min to connect to another bus is ridiculous!
1	Just keep doing what's being done now. Things are taken care of, and there are constant improvements and fixes happening. If existing parking really gets full in coming years, we will need more garage space and might get to the point where we need overflow parking with shuttles.
1	Increase safe lanes for biking throughout town. Educate drivers that bicycles are entitled to "take the lane" when needed for safety reasons, and that there should be a 3' margin when passing bikes in a vehicle. I think most motorists have no idea of these 2 things.
1	Increase bike transportation ability on Max buses. Increase ability to get downtown via bike. Right now the main east to west streets (Drake, Prospect, and Mulberry) are difficult to navigate by bike along their entire length. The lack of small connecting streets that continue east to west, or that have viable road crossings, makes it difficult to get downtown without having to make large detours.
1	Eliminate onstreet parking on college. Make the intersections on College (from Magnolia to at least Laporte, maybe Cherry/Willow) ones where all motor traffic stops (with no turns on red) and all pedestrians cross all directions. Every day there are near misses because turning motorists won't yield to peds in the crosswalks.
1	I live way on the south side by Carpenter & public transportation is a headache for me, so I drive. I understand, but hate the 2 hour limit, so if I want to shop & go to lunch, I have to move my car. I will not pay to park. Perhaps if the garage was free for residents, it would free up space on the street for tourists. Or at least make the garage parking free for 4 hours for residents. 2 hours parking on the street is not a lot of time to shop & eat.
1	Parking garages on the north end of town. More available parking in back of stores, restaurants and shops.
1	Public transit seems to be the key factor missing in reducing parking demand. It certainly is the case for my family with young kids, living in Midtown and a mile from the MAX. We've never taken it, but would LOVE to. We moved here from what I would guess is the best mass transit system in the country and that was a huge compromise, to lose it.
1	Improve safety at the pedestrian crossing at Mason and Cherry (by the Discovery Museum). More bike racks.
1	Make the Max biking into downtown very convenient. Buses come often and regularly. Bridges keep the Max system quick and efficient. More trails and protected bike paths leading into downtown would encourage folks to come via bike. Lots of bike racks and room on the Max to store bikes would also be helpful. Sometime no cars is the answer. Could auxiliary roads be built to encourage through traffic to go around downtown?
1	Increased service (area and time running). It is especially important to offer MAX at bar closing time, not only to encourage public transit use but to prevent drunk driving.
1	It seems to me that the MAX is still quite limited in reach, and doesn't connect the areas that I'm most concerned about.
1	Work with local business to put a coupon book out bi-annually, which would reward customers for riding their bikes into the store. Trust system?
1	Take a page from the Singapore book. Establish rules governing when, and under what circumstances, cars can be driven into the center city, e.g., require that disks be purchased and displayed which signal that the car's driver has paid a fee for entry; for cars with 2 or more passengers, there would be no fee.
1	Good question, not an easy task and one that no matter what is done, many will gripe The trains aren't going away so people just need to chill and learn to live with them
1	Increase number of parking areas along the route and implement enhanced travel corridors. The time has come to address congestion on Prospect.
1	metered parking in heart of downtown, more parking garages in/near downtown, no more development of big structures without adequate parking

1	Make certain all major businesses, all development proposals include adequate parking as part of the plan (looking at you, Otterbox)
1	Other routes like 18 and 14 amongst other routes to be utilized more along with higher frequencies. Some people don't drive and for those who do face traffic congestion and the lack of parking.
1	Marketing options that are available. Currently, parking issues seem to be more of a perceived issue instead of a true issue. In 2-3 years it will become more of a true issue.
1	We have a major trucking route flowing through downtown. For anyone who has had to cross Jefferson, Riverside and College, this feels unsafe, unpleasant, and unsightly. Ft Collins should work to move this freight highway directly to I-25, giving pass-through truckers the choice to avoid the downtown area. If that is not possible, propose a short-term workaround and demand change in the long-term.
1	Include SUNDAY Transfort/Bus service. Tell the City Council that this is a public service, not a money-maker! Whether from the Climate Action Plan for reduced emissions, or from an economic/retail viewpoint, this is imperative for ALL ages. Visionary!
1	design the bus system so that E-W routes link up easier with Max stops (more of a grid system)- why is there an assumption that al routes must lead to downtown?
1	Continue to develop sidewalks in areas they are missing, slow down cars in frequently walked/biked areas, protected bike lanes on Remington and Howes - NOT Mason!
1	Focus on and build the culture and outcome you want. Wider sidewalks. Easier bike parking. Covered bike parking (cage not necessary). Bike valet for events is so cool! Thanks!
1	Metered Parking, additional bike racks, additional motorcycle and 'eco' parking, and enhanced maintenance of sidewalks leading into downtown.
1	Look into increased bus frequency during peak times and events. Continue to expand parking and larger scale housing along the MAX line.
1	Most, downtown streets do not have bike lanes, forcing cyclists to merge with traffic. This is very dangerous because downtown drivers are not adequately aware of cyclists.
1	Physically separated bike lanes. Biking with small children or as a family in Fort Collins is sometimes scary.
1	The walkability and biking in Fort Collins is our Hallmark. Being a national leader in innovation in those areas will continue to guarantee the future of our downtown area as a national example of excellence and creative solutions. "Best practices" alone (without vision) are a timid approach. Innovative practices means being the first to try something and have others write articles about "best practices" based on what we have attempted as a community.
1	Provide connections running East/West along major corridors. For instance a MAX style bus that runs the Harmony corridor, that one could use to connect to the current MAX
1	Find several solutions to get people to downtown without using their cars (and don't forget about kids)
1	offer small car parking, alternative fuel stops, rewards for carpooling, bring fun transport back! Unearth the old trolley route and bring trolley's back! Make it fun to get down town year round. Keep horse rides off of College. Or only offer them seasonally like in the winter with jingle bells and hot chocolate. The horse carts don't fit with concrete and auto's.
1	Look for ways to improve the use of mass transit from the rest of the City. It isn't any good to improve MAX if there isn't a convenient way to get there. If there isn't it is just easier for me to take my car downtown.
1	Find funds to build several parking structures spread around the downtown area. Use good signage to inform motorists where there is availability.
1	I'm not sure. It's a real pain to find parking & then get to where you need to go. With three kids, it can be too much.

Count	Response
1	Innovative? Well, it's not popular, but perhaps the best way to reduce parking demand is to increase the price of parking. Refer to the work of Donald Shoup: http://freakonomics.com/2013/03/13/parking-is-hell-a-new-freakonomics-radio-podcast/
1	PEDESTRIAN BRIDGE OVER NORTH COLLEGE. I appreciate the efforts going into making North College a more integrated and inclusive part of our community - however - I am terrified for my life to walk or bike up there. I am so excited for new, creative, community-building businesses like the proposed new Lyric to go into that area, but it feels like there is no safe or appealing way to get there by bike or foot.
1	Fort Collins is unique in that we are fortunate to have adequate and convenient parking downtown but not so much parking where it seems to take away from the availability of real estate to shops and businesses. Continue to have free spaces, but limit the time to 60-90 minutes rather than two hours. People who stay downtown for two hours can park in a garage. I would like it if you can emphasize a low cost of parking; perhaps let businesses validate parking tickets so that people can stay longer than one hour in a garage for free. People shouldn't have to pay to park if they just want to grab a couple things at City Drug and get a haircut. I believe that i costs to park will drive people away and disproportionately harm small independent local businesses.
1	Provide parking area to the North of town where residents can take public transportation to the downtown areas.
1	People who live South of Prospect have no real way to get downtown (other than driving) unless they use Max. But once you are already driving to the Max station (because the E-W trails on the South end are lacking too), it makes just as must sense to drive the rest of the way downtown. In order to encourage biking to get downtown and walking once you are there, the connections from other parts of town really need to be considered.
1	Make it way more expensive and inconvenient to get around by car and safe and affordable to get around other ways. We need to model after great Europeans cities that long ago gave up the idea that every single person should move around in a gas powered car.
1	Pedestrian and bike paths sculpted out of roads and alleys to encourage people to walk. The renovation of the alleys has helped this.
1	Parking assessments for different kinds of businesses should be made and an adequate amount of spaces ensured.
1	For example, the new Hotel that is expected to be built, this should include parking to cover all occupants the hotel can manage, plus a floor for local parking. Turn the lot where the Elk's lodge was into parking. Make it mandatory for workers from downtown to park in garages, make affordable or almost free for them. Many are parking on the residential streets surrounding downtown and walking to work. This is causing parking issues for those homes by areas like the library. Also would like to see something set up for overnight cars - like if a person parked downtown and needed cab to get safely home, there should be more time allowed for them to retrieve their cars. The choice to not drink and drive should over ride the 2 hour limit at 10:00 am. Keeping in mind they were at the bars late and no sober, so an early morning is not going to happen. I think the fear of a ticket pushing some younger adults to drive home when they should not.
1	Any and all new structures should be required to have on-site/underground parking adequate for its use. Also, downtown business employees should be asked/required to park outside of downtown - possibly at reduced rates, to make more parking available for consumers.
1	See above. And what about off site parking areas scattered around with a continuous shuttle to Downtown? In a perfect world those parking lots would be shading cars with solar panels! Also having a no cost or low cost parking garage or two for downtown employees. I know people who park on the street and move their car every two hours. IMO, they are taking parking spots better served for visitors. Make driving boring, walking and biking a delightful experience.
1	Free rides or discounted rates on certain days (e.g., big festivals). Or discounts at downtown businesses or free food/drinks at festivals for those showing they took public transportation to the event.
1	Distribute parking throughout downtown. The lack of parking is a deterrent for my wife to meet me downtown for lunch or take the kids to events there.

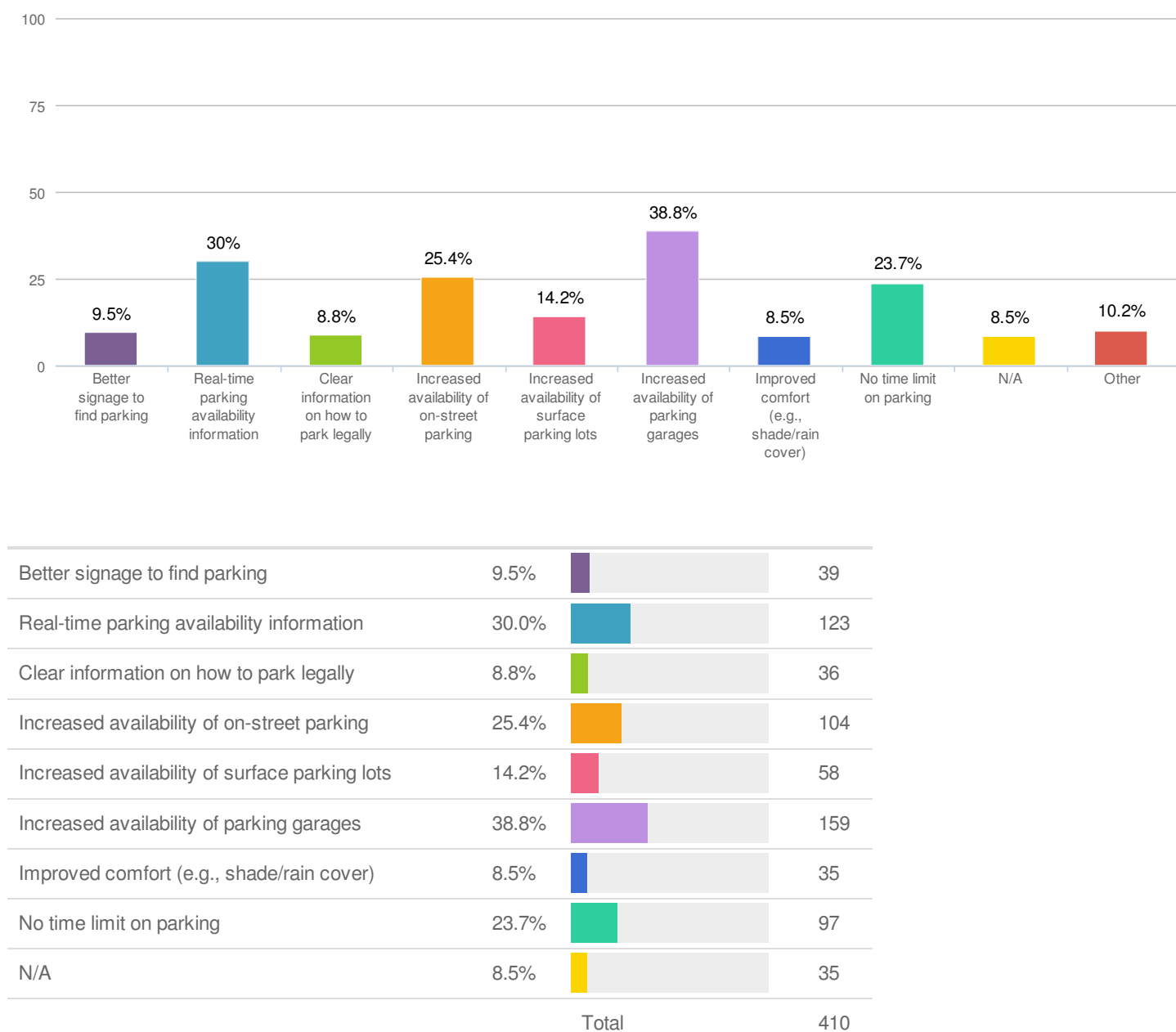

1	They are all great except for letter A. Bikes get squeezed between traffic and parked cars. I understand that some roads are tight, and there is no other options. I love buffered and raised protection for bikes.
1	Again it's kind of hard to pick a favorite based on these pictures. I favor almost any design that keeps me separated and safe from cars and away from the noise and exhaust.
1	My concern with the protected bike lanes is visibility at intersections and the difficulty of making left hand turns.
1	I can't think of many places downtown with room for a 2-way protected lane. In downtown, I suspect shared use paths will be way to crowded, with bicyclists trying to go too fast by walkers.
1	I prefer bike lanes between the carparks and the footpaths: no extra space is used when compared with bike lanes on the other side of the carparks, and it is so much safer.
1	One set of bike lanes running east/west & north/south are enough. We don't need bike lanes on every street. College is still a US Highway and doesn't need further constriction neither do all the area street where parking is at a premium. Bikes are not the answer to every problem. It seems folks in city government think bikes are the answer to everything. I'm not anti-bike. I ride a bike, but I'm also pragmatic. If we want more tourists downtown, where are they going to get bikes? Many tourists and new residents to town are elderly who realistically don't ride or can't ride bikes. I agree that we need to make bike access much safer, unfortunately most bike riders aren't safe themselves -- city accident stats prove that the majority of accidents are the bicyclist's fault. It is also much better for retail window shopping to have people walk instead of riding a bike past a store.
1	They are all great options. Just pick something for our town- as it is growing fast and we need to have better bike lanes and parking vs catering to cars. Future is in BIKING!!! Look overseas- they can do this just fine.

It's really tough to know when cars are going to suddenly back up, and especially nerve-wracking when I'm biking with my young son, who doesn't yet have the experience to instinctively know what clues indicate a car backing up (brake lights, engine, etc). Yet we're not allowed to bike on the sidewalks downtown... and it can take a while to walk our bikes on the sidewalk to get to our destination.

1	If a store owner wants to add bike parking to their personal parking lot,it should look however the business owner wants. If the municipality wants to remove parking from downtown and add bike parking, it should be in whatever form they think is appropriate.
1	I would definitely trade convenience for security and for having adequate space so my bike isn't crammed in and tangled with fifty other junk bikes.
1	If you don't want bikes on the sidewalk - don't put the bike racks on the sidewalks. And by covered bike parking I am thinking more flat roof covered...
1	I don't want to sacrifice more car parking for bike large bike parking when few ride except in summer. I really like the New Belgium-style parking -- one parking space for 20 bikes.
1	Many of the bike racks do not have 'rungs' that come up high enough. For this reason, I often chain my bike to signs. Also, the risk with large bike racks is that another bike owner could chain their bike to yours.
1	I do think the covered parking is a good idea, but it runs the risk of giving shelter to a lot of the homeless. Not that I have hard feelings towards them, but from an image standpoint that's how it makes me feel. So staffed and secured parking makes sense to me, and gives the added bonus of increasing jobs in the downtown area.
1	Get rid of those stupid NBB racks (pictured in E), they are not practical. CSU has racks that resemble coat hangers - this is the best style of bike rack for accommodating all types and sizes of bikes. Replace more street parking spaces with bike racks like that.
1	I like the covered ones, however I think they might take up too much space. The lockers are nice too, for cyclists who ride to work and have to lock their bikes up for hours on end.

1	For any new builds or renovations, reuse elements discarded from elsewhere (EG: bricks, art deco elements, etc.). Keep the shops, stores, and restaurants more of the mom and pop variety and not members of a chain.
1	One of many things that Fort Collins has going is the downtown charm next to the river. If people are moving here for the small town feel than don't lose it. Promote the social atmosphere with low impact living and sustainable development.
1	remove restrictions for citizens to use their property as outdoor market places. Allow outdoor markets in turf parts of parks. Allow business owners to use their parking lots as marketplaces as they see fit.
1	Keep doing what you are doing now. When something is to be built in Old Town, use the review process to make sure it fits architecturally.

1	I think preserving character involves a distinct reverence for researched historical elements as well and identifying local... art, artists, musicians, craftsmen, food and spirits and promoting what we have here.
1	Give the Food Co-op a more prominent space downtown. I read an article on the new manager -- he sounds like he can do excellent things for our community.
1	Enforce the codes that are supposedly in place, and make the committee that approves new additions/buildings adhere to those. There is absolutely no reason that the atrocity on Mountain and Washington should have been built, (in the same light as the house on Whitcomb a few years back) if City Council had listened to the citizens of Old Town West.
1	Drawing on successful existing precedents will reinforce a local identity that is already present. Reinforce what is great while allowing for new creative expressions. This is innovation rooted in history.
1	Maybe have a list of styles that are compatible with the existing style, and those get streamlined building permits?
1	I support design guidelines. I do not support a big diversity of architectural styles downtown. Part of what makes Old Town so nice is the lovely and consistent architectural style of the buildings. I would like to see this style continued outward,
1	Promote exciting new architecture and new mixed-use development. Increase the density of Old Town and surrounding areas by building taller. Always encourage a vibrant, diverse pedestrian experience. Commission high quality street art (sculpture, murals, etc).
1	Whatever Boulder is doing don't do that. We don't want to become Boulder. Preserve historic buildings and support small businesses (not ritzy galleries, expensive restaurants, and expensive stores)
1	Get information and assistance from the Historic Preservation Office and Planning Departments to identify some basic characteristics and forms, i.e. roof lines, window shapes, materials, basic forms.
1	I see that being accomplished by created a market at the Trolley Barn and giving the Food Co-op the opportunity to have their new location there.
1	Don't add anymore gateways (Pat Stryker). Don't remove buildings, but repurpose. Think about the overall feel of the Old Town (I didn't say Downtown) and build in cohesiveness with it. If we need another exciting place to go in town, to spread the wealth (& pressure), let's make another exciting place in Mid-Town or Harmony, before all the property is built on.
1	Keep green spaces and parks undeveloped so we can continue using them for events and markets. Continue with year round farmers markets for fresh produce and an outlet for farmers
1	It was difficult to choose between preserve and allow for diverse styles. I like diversity but I have my limits. I don't want to see palm trees here - we are not the beach. But, I do think classic old west looking buildings blend well with high-design modern structures. Insist on quality finishes that last.
1	I would love to see a wide Boulevard coming from I25 that has green space/trees bikes and pedestrian walking with fewer cars moving more slowly - a scenic route entrance. Prospect?
1	IDENTIFY needs to start with an inventory of historic sites and of their design elements. The trick in this (as indicated by my comment above) is in honoring the established characteristics while not becoming hidebound.
1	The beauty of old town, is the look of the old buildings, many towns no longer have there city cores any longer. People enjoy that look and feel.
1	Fort Collins should be a distinctive place that embodies a character, look, flavor, and heritage that are not found in other locations, especially within the surrounding region. By being distinctive, a downtown or neighborhood business district can provide a viable alternative to its competition. A downtown's sense of place was not created at a single point in time. It has evolved to represent multiple generations. Communities change over time economically, socially, and culturally, and downtowns are better able than most places to reflect that in their built environment. Conversely, most suburban places, including newly developed town centers, have not evolved; rather, they are snapshots that reflect the values, tastes, trends, and priorities of the time in which they were built. Unfortunately many new buildings in Old Town area have a false history.

Not all festivals have to be at Civic center park- where street closure happens and it is difficult for clean up and you can't stake in the ground. Move the festivals to other areas in Fort Collins. Go South: Go to midtown: teach people about our city and not that everything is in downtown.
1	Fort Collins has done a great job at creating design standards; possibly too good a job. It would be nice to see more diversity of innovative and exciting architectural styles, particularly in the urban areas. Modern and historic can blend and complement each other when thoughtfully done.
1	Focus on authenticity - preserve the character that's there, but don't require new buildings to try to build in old styles.
1	Please look at Granville Island Market in Vancouver for ideas. This is great place. Our Town is growing quickly. It would be great to develop area north of town: Legacy Park: put some money into there and have parking lot and possible market there.
1	Most people refer to the downtown area as "Old Town" for a reason. Keep the old, historically significant buildings. Blend modern architecture with stone/brick naturally old looking architecture. Also, allow for landscaping which preserves the character of the outdoor elements of Fort Collins and Colorado.
1	Making sure that Fort Collins is still FoCo! We are an historic area, lets keep that alive while allowing for modern needs like energy and sustainability.
1	Work with potential new developers and strongly encourage integration. See downtown Frankfurt, Germany for a good example of how not to do that.
1	The architecture of the buildings are important, a design consistency. Without them all looking the same. Don't build large apt complexes that look like sterile ugly boss. Such as The Summit, north of downtown on Maple and Laporte.
1	Offer tax incentives to local business owners or increase/improve tenant rights so that local businesses remain open and fewer Boulder and Denver-based businesses move into downtown.
1	Convert old trolley barn to a covered year-round farmers market/produce/meat/fish market adjoined to an new covered artisan market for sculpture, painting, graphic arts, etc., cooperate in all this with CSU age holo and arts school.
1	Strict limits on building heights (3 stories), unfriendly changes to the streetscape (e.g. Mason at the courthouse), and encourage further pedestrian connectivity as was done with the alleyways. Continue restoring building facades, while separating traffic from pedestrian routes with vegetation, art, etc.
1	Maintain the old buildings and build new building that maintain the old style with hints of modernism

1	The number one consideration for new development should be high-quality materials, thoughtful design, and sensitivity to the use of the building and the surrounding context. If new buildings are designed well and built to last, then "matching" historic buildings is less important.
1	The top priority I chose could be accomplished by protecting building through the Historical Society and restoring the outside of historic buildings and renovating the inside to modern standards. Also, any new buildings could be built to blend in with the brick buildings of Old Town, much like Beau Joe's new building, enhance the already existing character of these buildings and the area of Old Town.
1	identify areas of downtown that can be updated and altered and identify areas that are protected...set design standard for the entire area.
1	Maintaining the building height zoning standard, consistent architectural design, integrating new additions that will enhance the downtown experience,
1	Establishing sidewalk gardens/growing walls that celebrate our emphasis on culture & community food.
1	A unified look is key, the charm and desirability of Europe lies in large part to the diversity of the towns and countries to visit *while* keeping unity within each town. By keeping a somewhat narrowed emphasis on the historical and established architecture, we do not deny or negate the beauty that other styles have. To incorporate some other style out of a sense of trend is even worse, because trends change and then we're stuck with having to update again and again and again to keep up. Better to stay in character with only carefully considered blending.

Looking around at old and new buildings over the last couple of weeks, I feel that inclusion of natural or "historical" materials, mostly stone and brick, in building facades, even as little as 25-30% of the non-glass facade, goes a long way to making the building feel like it fits in.
1	Downtown needs to grow as our population grows. Large gathering spaces for concerts and farmers markets are appropriate while still allowing for lots of activity to occur among shops and streets.
1	Riverside is just an unattractive street. Not sure how it could be made better - i'm not an urban designer.

I think the current transition areas (Mason, Howes, North College, Lincoln Ave, River District) need to try hard to maintain street setbacks, small frequent storefronts, and residential/office on the upper two or three floors. I know a lot of this is underway, but I think the River District and "River North" (College Ave north of the river) areas are not being considered fully enough in the same way the core of downtown. The core's frequency of storefronts is what makes it pedestrian friendly (and not car friendly). Banners that say something like "Old Town, a pedestrian friendly community" are a bandaid on ill-planned communities. And, I would think some of those edges will need to help support parking needs, with garage or partial garage structures.

1	Smaller housing units might make space for more housing units, given the housing market in Fort Collins, this would be a real asset to the community.
1	Denser housing is appropriate downtown, whether it is apartment buildings or lofts above businesses or townhome/row houses. Higher-density living is important for making housing more affordable, and reducing traffic congestion, and supporting public transportation. Housing with nice architecture is much more important than the type of housing. For example: - The apartments in the old Northern Hotel are a lovely fit downtown. - The modern boxy condos and apartments along North Mason Street would NOT be a good design for closer to Old Town. - The modern Victorian style of the Mason Street North lofts (at Mason and Cherry) with courtyards is nice.
1	Traditional "live-work" - old buildings with stores below and affordable apartments above, with an emphasis on the affordable. I also like the idea of blending semi-industrial buildings with living, playing, and dining - like the RiNo neighborhood in Denver.
1	I think what has occurred along Cherry Street is a great example of compatibility, dimension, and contributing to a sense of place.
1	Allowing for diversity in design so growth doesn't look cookie cutter. Throwing all faith to one concept or design may only yield failed developments for living/work downtown.
1	The issue with all of these is parking. I only see one with a garage. If business and housing are to play nicely with each other, there needs to be enough parking for both.

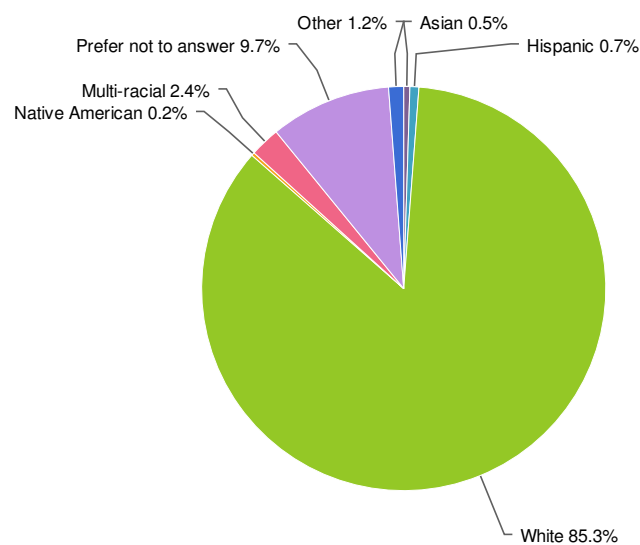

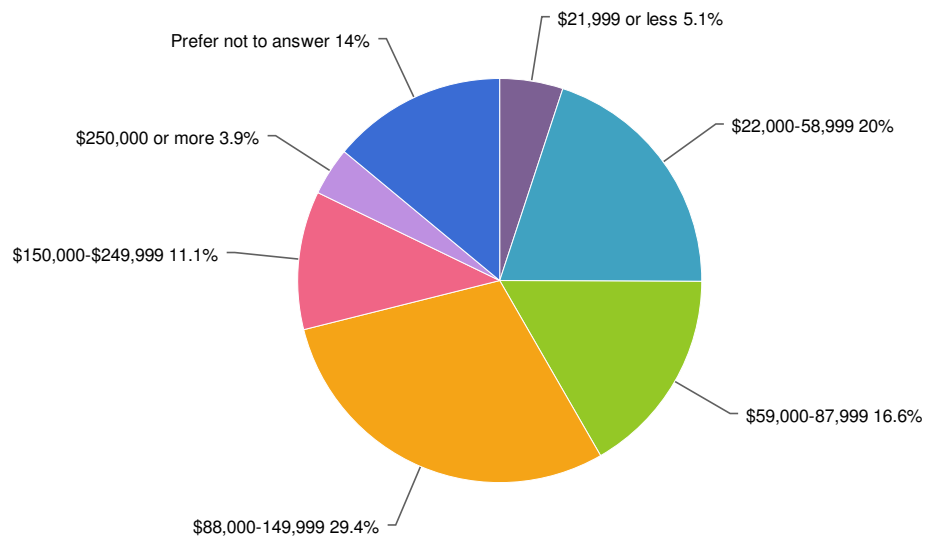
