Priority 1 calls are the emergency, life-and-death situations that require an immediate response from first responders. In 2023, our goal was **5 minutes**, **15 seconds** or less from the time dispatch received the call until an officer arrived on scene.

FORT COLLINS POLICE ACADEMY

Since the first class of cadets graduated in 2021, our academy continues to allow FCPS to train recruits from day one on the skills, mindset, and values required to be a Fort Collins police officer. In 2023, **two academy classes** were held with a total of **14 officer graduates**. We also hired four community service officers in 2023 who attended portions of the academy with their sworn co-workers.



SKILLS TRAINING

In 2023, our officers attended a total of **12,453** hours of skills training.

OPTICAL SIGHT PISTOLS

During 2023, our Firearms Training Unit transitioned
46 of our police officers to using optical sights on
their pistols, sometimes known as RDS. Currently,
65 of our officers have been issued RDS pistols.

These add **spatial awareness**, **speed**, and **accuracy** by removing sight alignment from the process, which streamlines the actions and makes it much more intuitive for the human eyes. These also allow officers to keep both eyes open, see their aiming point in the dark, and increase margins for safety during times of great stress.

AGENCY ACCREDITATIONS



In 2023, we received our four-year **CALEA** reaccreditation. CALEA stands for the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies and is known as the Gold Standard in Public Safety. Fort Collins Police Services earned initial CALEA accreditation in 2019. Following each accreditation, ongoing work is required to maintain certification. The agency must pass an annual review, as well as official reaccreditation every four years. Our next annual review will be in May of 2024.



The agency also earned accreditation through the **Colorado Association of Chiefs of Police** in 2014. We were reaccredited in 2019, and will complete another review in 2024.



FC911 continues to maintain its status as an Accredited Center of Excellence through the **International Academies of Emergency Dispatch**. In 2023, FC911 triaged and provided EMD (Emergency Medical Dispatching) on 13,740 calls for service with the monthly average of 1,145 EMD calls.

HOMELESS OUTREACH AND PROACTIVE ENGAGEMENT (HOPE)

In 2023, FCPS started a pilot project that involved the creation of a unit of three officers and one sergeant to provide comprehensive response to public safety issues surrounding homelessness in Fort Collins. The HOPE Team's goal is to address problems through accountability and collaboration with other City departments, service providers, and outreach programs. From April to December, HOPE Team members: Handled **3,088** calls for service Facilitated **69** community outreach events

Conducted the removal of **25** RVs/cars

Supported **1,046** camp clean-ups, which included 2,080 needles.

> MENTAL HEALTH RESPONSE TEAM



In 2021, our co-responder program formally became the Mental Health Response Team (MHRT). In 2023, our MHRT expanded to **four officer-clinician teams** allowing for 7-day per week coverage.

This graph shows the liquor compliance failure rate for each year since 2019. This rate has steadily decreased over these five years. In 2023, our goal was to have a less than 10% failure rate, which was met with a **9.17%** failure rate.

Marijuana underage compliance checks are at 100% and have been for the last three years.

TRAFFIC SAFETY

FCPS takes a dual approach to impact traffic safety: education and enforcement. We educate by regularly sharing traffic-related information. Enforcement takes three forms; the traditional traffic stop and citation, the use of red-light cameras, and the camera radar speed program.

The Criminal Investigations Division (CID) is home to eight investigative and support teams: **Crimes Against Persons Unit**, **Forensic Services Unit**, **Property and Evidence Unit**, **Victim Services Unit**, **Property Crimes Unit**, **Criminal Impact Unit**, **Cyber Crimes Unit**, **and the Northern Colorado Drug Task Force**. Two criminalists were added to the division this year, one in the Cyber Crimes Unit and one in the Crimes Against Persons Unit. The position has proven to add great value to the division as the individual essentially functions as a detective in a non-sworn position, able to do most of the same duties without the POST training/qualification requirements that detectives have. This allows the highly trained individual(s) to supplement detective responsibilities, solely focusing on their job and greatly impacting the workload in CID.

CID's case count increased **9.8% in 2023**, after a 3.5% increase in 2022. The increase in cases is primarily attributable to an increase in fraud, theft, and cybercrime related cases. **Fraud** related cases continue to be the #1 case type investigated, followed by **theft** and **sexual assault on a child**.
