1. OPENING

- Group Feedback
 - Committee members stated they have benefitted from being part of the committee and are learning a lot more about law enforcement. They also stated that they have had opportunities to share the information they are learning with friends, groups they are part of, and colleagues.

- 3. COMMITTEE QUESTIONS AND FEEDBACK
 - One committee member asked if FCPS provides intern opportunities.

- Assistant Chief Kristy Volesky answered that we do, but it was paused due to COVID. The agency is hoping to get that back up and running soon.
- Assistant Chief Tim Doran stated that we hope to have paid internship opportunities at some point in the future as well.
- A committee member asked about the rates of serious bodily injury and fatality traffic collisions, especially regarding bikers and pedestrians.
 - Assistant Chief John Feyen responded that generally, our rates are low, but we are seeing a large uptick to what we refer to as vulnerable populations (i.e., pedestrians, bicyclists, folks on scooters). He stated that the data is hard to make connections out of due to varying details (time of day, were they in or out of the crosswalk, who is at fault, what intersection it occurred at, etc.).
 - FCPS, and the City, are looking hard at how they can impact this issue.
 This isn't just a police problem; we have traffic engineers with the City who are also working to help us and it is very much a concern for City Council.
 - Currently there are four red-light cameras and two camera-radar (speed monitoring) vehicles, and we are hoping to add two more camera radar vehicles soon.
