What causes homelessness?

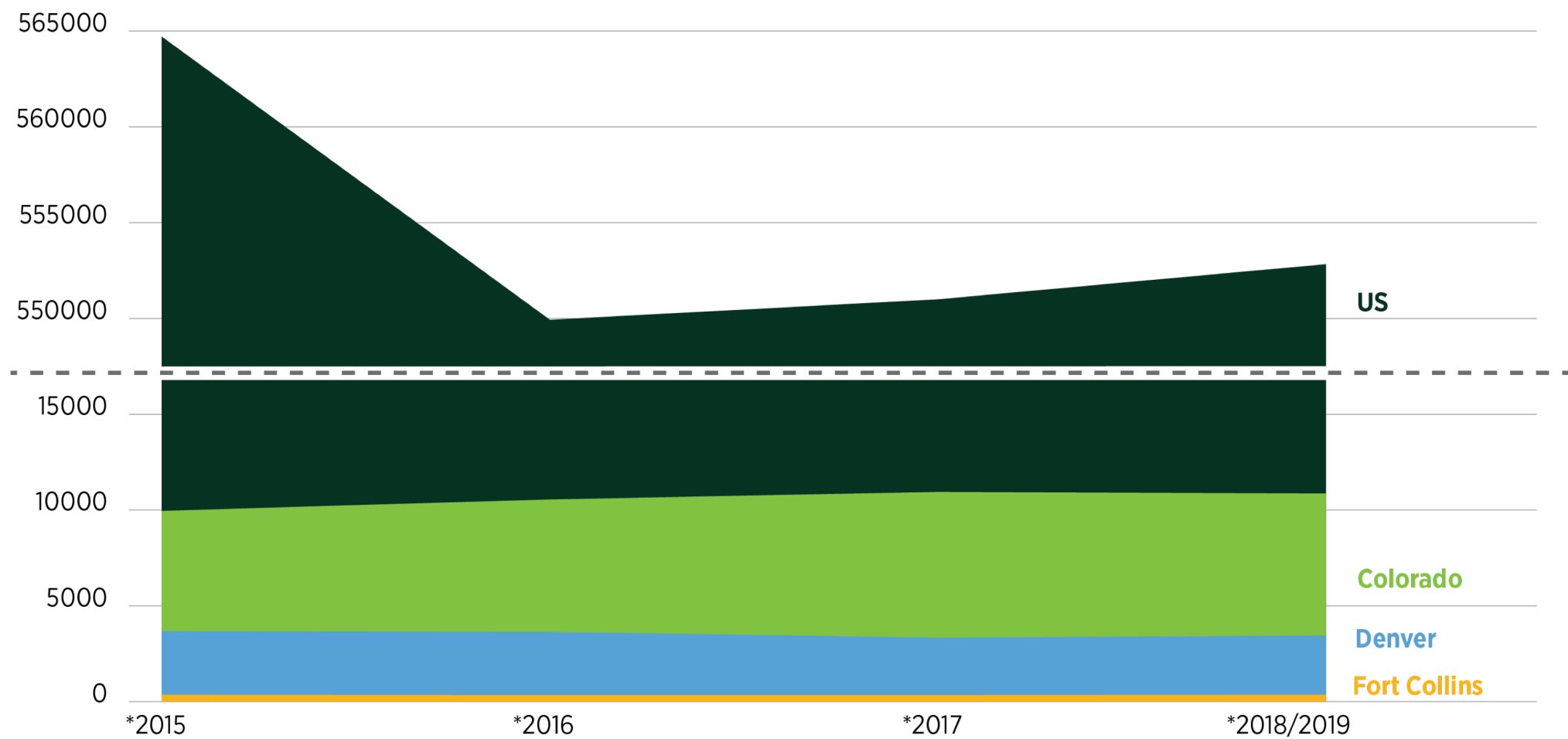
- Individual circumstance

Why does homelessness persist?

- Lack of housing that low income and fixed income people can afford
- Especially most vulnerable





The Growing Chronic Homelessness Crisis Fort Collins, Q1 2019

- Current total: **432**
- Entered long-term homelessness Jan-Mar 2019: **68**
- Housed/positive exited: **23**
- Seniors 61+: **50**
- Veterans: **27**
- Women: **121**
- Persons reporting a disability: **186**
- Housing barriers: **183 entering with \$0 income**

Cost of Housing and Services

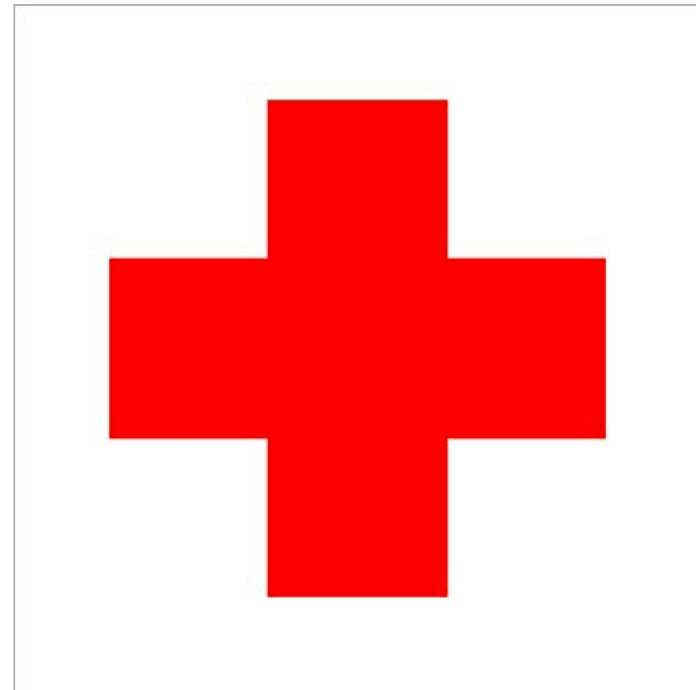
\$13,000 - \$25,000

What are key *prevention* interventions?



- Identify at-risk
- Eviction Prevention
- Inreach before discharge
- Adequate affordable units
 - (0-30% AMI)

What are key *shelter* and 'exit' interventions?

- Low barrier
- Coordinated intake and assessment
- Housing search and placement
- Outreach
- 'Navigation Centers'
- Recovery programs



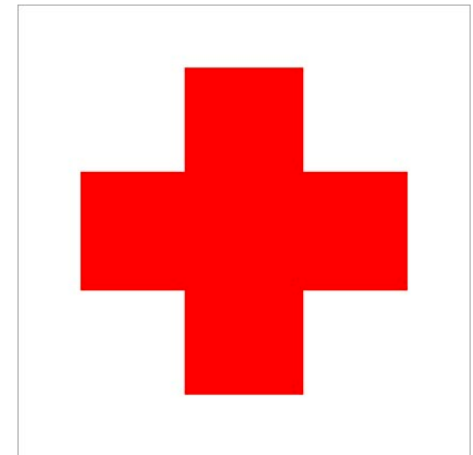
What are key *housing* interventions?



- More Supportive Housing units
- Deepest affordability: 0-30%AMI
- Rapid Rehousing and flex funds
- Housing Retention
- Landlord Engagement
- Hotel/motel conversions

What are key *services* interventions?

- Consumer-driven
- Intensive & Clinical Case Management
- Healthcare
- Income development
- Police Co-responders
- Alternative Sentencing



What are key *system* interventions?

- Housing First
- Resource alignment
- Coordinated prioritization
- Cross sector and niche partnerships
- Housing as healthcare



A system of accountability.

- Clearly identify intended outcomes.
- Alignment.
- Assess progress.
- Continuously improve.



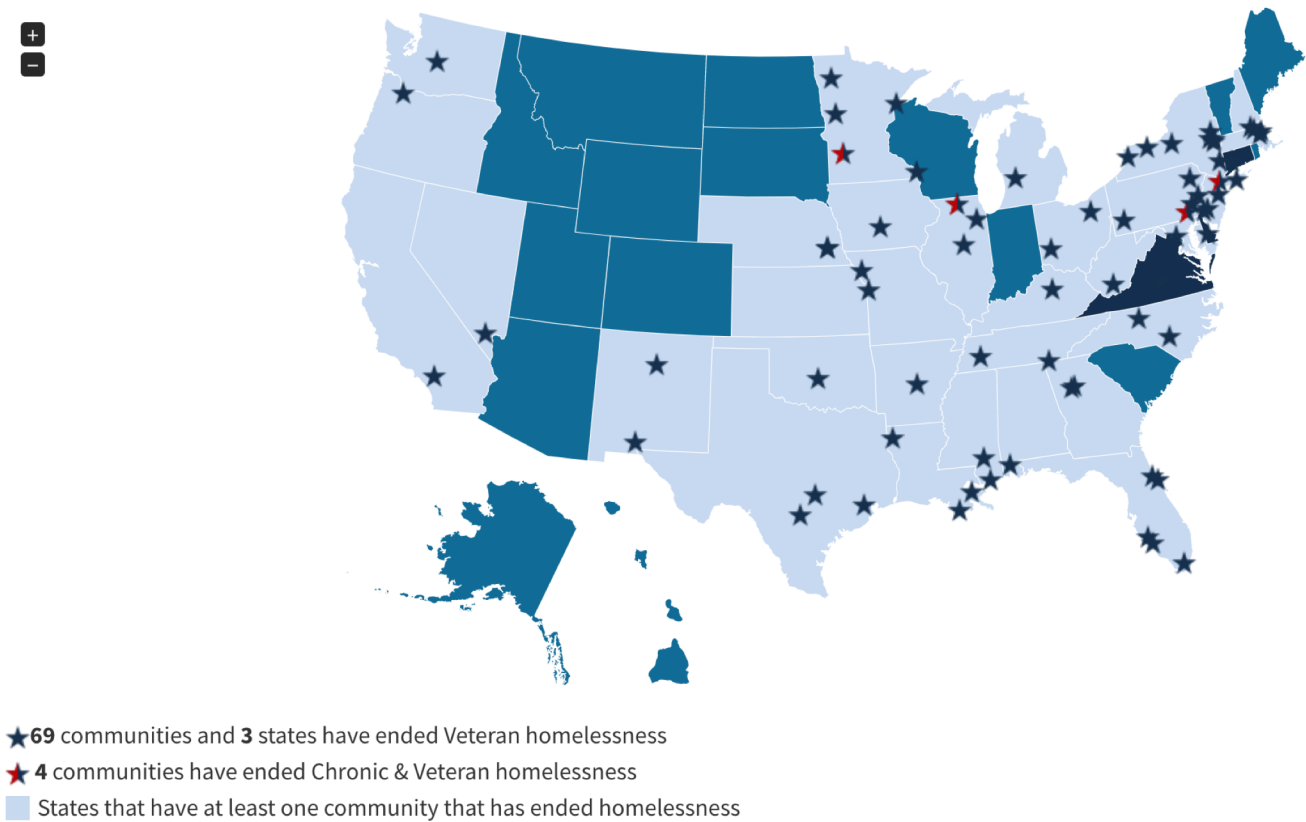
Aggressive, results-based approaches.

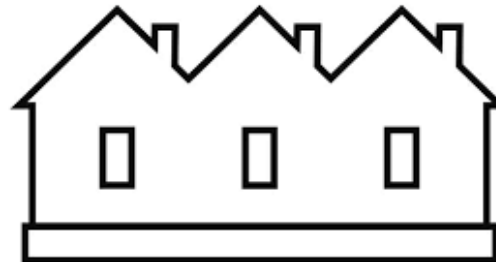
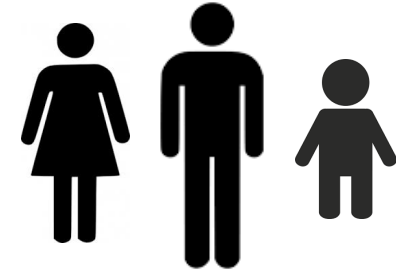

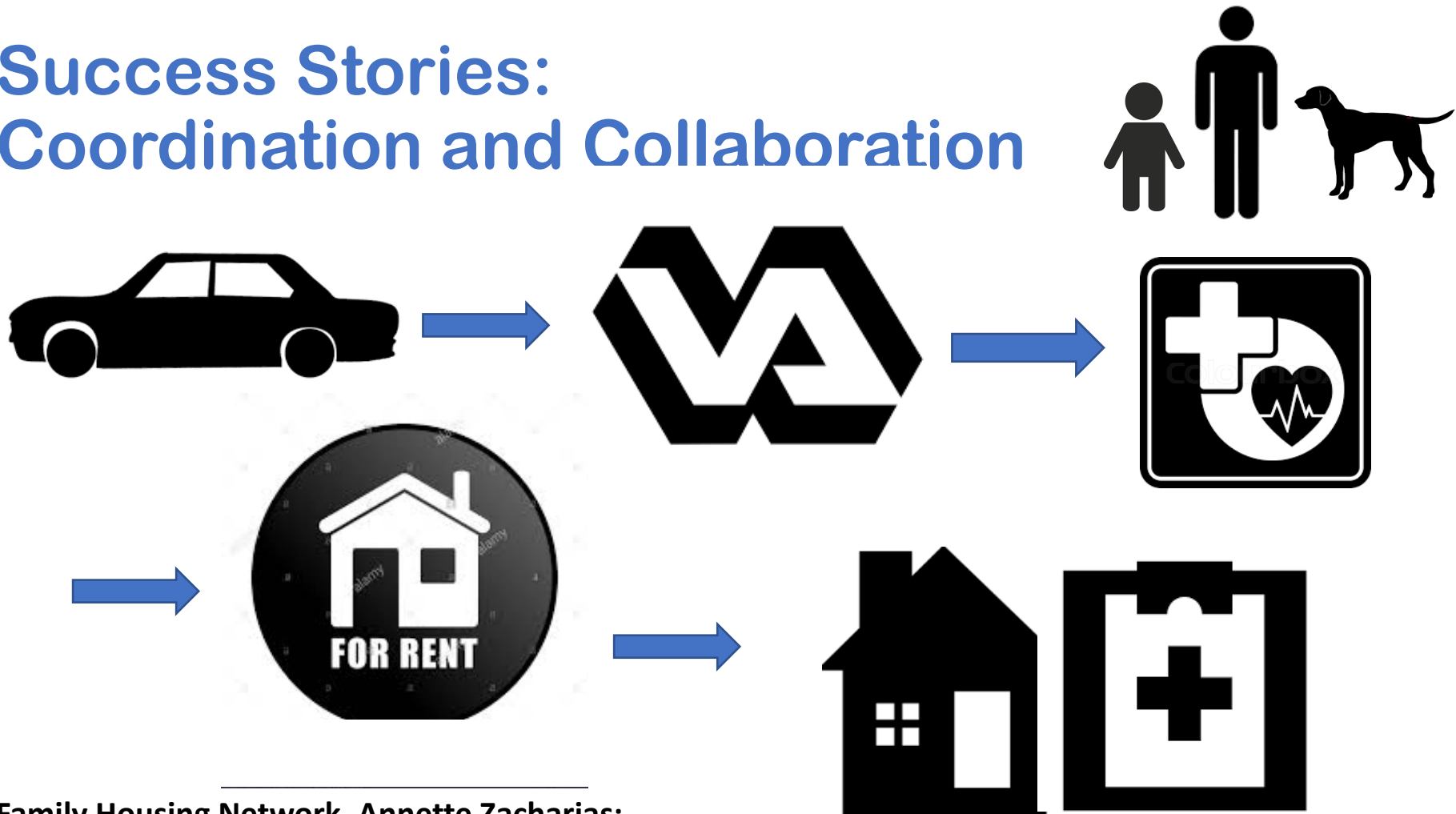
